## SANGUINE AFFRAY IN A SALOON

Aaron Ross, Jr. Starts Trouble And is Nearly Slashed to Death With a Knife.

## WRECK ON UNION PACIFIC.

Grand Jury May Investigate Abnormal High Prices of Living—Municipal and County Affairs.

Ogden, Sept. 10.—In a saloon brawl last evening, Aaron Ross, Jr., met with injuries, inflicted with a knife, that came within a hair's breadth of costing him his life. Ross with other twenty-fifth street saloon, about 10 o'clock in the evening. There he met a man, a stranger to the crowd, with whom he entered into an argument. One word brought on another, and soon they were quarreling and fighting. Ross, who is somewhat of a scrapper, seemed to be getting the best of the fight when his antagonist pulled his pocket knife and slashed Ross a murderous cut across the throat, making a gash several inches long that required 25 stitches to close. Another gash in the breast which required one stitch to close it. The slashing with the knife caused Ross to release his hold. From the side gashing wound, the neck the blood flowed freely and in the excitement to do something to stop the flow of blood, his assailant escaped from the saloon, and as no one in the saloon knew his name or where he came from, the police who were called were at a loss to find him. Ross, however, having only his description, but they hope to arrest him if he did not get out of the city.

Immediately after the affray the police were telephoned for and quickly responded. They also summoned City Physician Condon, who dressed Ross' wounds as quickly as possible and had him removed to the home of his father, Ross has been injured in numerous scrapes, but those inflicted last evening brought him closer to death than any before. Some who were in the saloon told the police that having picked the quarrel with the fellow, while others claim the man who wielded the knife was the aggressor.

## PRODIGIOUS CROP YIELDS.

One Apple Grover Has 110 Cars of Choice Fruit—Big Best Yield.

La Grande, Ore., Sept. 10.—Threshing is on in full blast. The wheat yield is splendid, many large fields averaging 60 bushels per acre. One man harvested an 80-acre tract of wheat which made an average of 58 bushels per acre. It is claimed some fields will reach 70 bushels per acre. One man claims 75 bushels per acre. The yield of small grain generally is simply immense and can be appreciated only by seeing it.

E. Z. Carbine, formerly of Parker, Ida., has closed a deal with a wholesale dealer in Wamsar, whereby Mr. Carbine sells 6,000 boxes of winter apples at \$1.50 per box. This lot means about 110 cars of apples, all of which will go east, some perhaps on the New York market. Grande Ronde apples are becoming famous in the United States and also in Europe. Mr. Carbine will have something to do in packing and shipping this lot of fruit.

The sugar factory will start to grind beets about Sept. 30. This surely has been an ideal season for beets and this section will have the best tonnage of any time since the establishment of the factory here.

Grange men claim that quite a number of the young people will attend general conference next month in Salt Lake. Young men and young ladies will go single but not expect to return in the same state.
