THE NEW TARIFF LAW.

Officials at Washington Preparing for Its Going Into Operation Tomorrow.

THE PRESIDENT APPOINTS INDIAN COMMISSIONERS.

WASHINGTON AFFAIRS.

The New Tariff Law--Wyoming's

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—Secretary Windom, Assistant Secretary Spaulding and Nettleton and General Agnew, who spent the day over questions that have arisen in regard to the execution of the new tariff law, which took effect Monday morning. Several important questions, desiring of receiving the full benefit of the existing tariff rates, applied to the Treasury Department for permission to enter their goods at the Custom House up to midnight Sunday. Assistant Secretary Spaulding has informed them that this is a matter entirely within the discretion of the collector of customs at the various ports, and that the department is not disposed to interfere in the matter.

General Spaulding said today that he did not anticipate any trouble with regard to the execution of the new law on the Pacific coast, by reason of the attitude of the custom officers to receive official copies of the law at the date it goes into operation, an attitude made manifest after Monday under the present law can be readily liquidated under the new law with very little delay.

INDIAN COMMISSIONERS.

The President has appointed the following Commissioners to the Indian Affairs: W. H. H. Fisher, Washington; Mark A. Fisher, Colfax, Wash.; William H. Barrell, Cheyenne, Wyo.; to visit the Warm Springs Indian Reservation in Oregon and report on the proper location of the future site of that reservation, and to negotiate with the Indians for a cession of part of that reservation.

The Speaker's desk in the House is a source of amusement to the few visitors at the Capitol. The blue line covering has been removed and the floor of the desk, where the gavel of the Speaker is laid, is found to be nothing but a mass of splinters, about the size of needles. Many of these splinters were taken away by visitors as souvenirs of the Fifty-third Congress.
