

MUSIC AND DRAMA

That the dawning theatrical season is to be handicapped to a great extent because of the Presidential election this fall, does not appear to be in any way verified yet, though what may come before it does cannot at this time be predicted. In New York and other cities of the country, where a fair estimate can be taken, the theatrical season has opened under the most ample circumstances, people being actually turned away for want of room. The theater-going population of the metropolis are thoroughly educated in dramatic art and for that reason nearly all of the new plays which have been produced in this country are given there; even the "gallery gods" in their expressions of approval or disapproval are very intelligent and reflect the opinion of the society people who frequent the stalls and boxes now. It is to be limited to a limited extent, small.
