THEATRICAL.—"The Child of the Regiment" and last appearance of Madame Scheller as Josephine attracted another large house on Saturday evening, and the performance went off in excellent style. The chorus singers redeemed themselves from their timidity of the first night, and did well. Madame Scheller, although almost too ill to perform, enacted the part of the heroine in her usual lively manner. The comedy is one of the best pieces we have seen this season. Madame Scheller's engagement has been a very successful one and if she should choose to return back to us again, she may be sure of a hearty and warm reception. She has contributed largely to the amusement of our people by her varied performances and her life-like representations. We wish her success wherever she goes. She is a lady and an artist in the full sense of the word.

To-morrow evening, Miss Annette Ince will make her first appearance as "Julia" in the "Hunchback," a role that will test her abilities to a great extent. We clip the following extract from a well known journal, which will give a fair idea of the lady's style of acting:

"One of the great attractions to us is the naturalness which distinguishes this lady's personations. There is no clap-trap or stage trickery; no laboring after mere effect; no tearing a 'passion to tatters' to please the immature tastes of the boisterous portion of the Theatre-goers, but an evident desire and constant aim to perceive and follow nature. POLICE MATTERS.—On Saturday last a man named Thomas Hooter, who had formerly been a driver on Wells, Fargo & Co's Eastern stage line, was arrested on a charge of having some weeks ago stolen Supt. Col. F. H. Head's valise and contents and some clothing belonging to a nephew of Governor Durkee.

N. P. Lake was also arrested on Saturday for partaking *ad libitum* of intoxicating beverages, under the influence of which he became rampaging and disturbed the equanimity of peace loving citizens; for which indulgence Justice Clinton informed him that he would have to hand over \$40 to the City Treasury.

Yesterday, Edward Cuthbert being influenced by excessive potations to the unwarrantable liberty of striking Mr. N. F. Blomqvist so forcibly with a sabre that the blade broke in two, this morning was fined \$40.

FIRE AT CAMP DOUGLAS.—Yesterday about three o'clock, a fire broke out in company G's quarters at camp. The fire originated in the sergeant's room, who, we are informed, is now under arrest. Among other property, about 2,000 rounds of cartridge were destroyed. We have not yet learned particulars of the full amount of damage done by the fire.

TRAGIC AFFAIR AT VIRGINIA, NEV.—The *Tribune* of the 27th ult. gives the particulars of an affair that occurred in Virginia City on the day previous, which resulted in the murder of a man named Walter Williams, and the suicide of his murderer, Peter Hill, commonly called "Russian Pete."

It appears that a Mr. Michael Green, while sleeping at a boarding house in Silver City, on the evening of the 18th ult., was robbed of \$105 in gold coin, and a watch which were abstracted from between the mattresses of the bed upon which he was sleeping. Suspicion fell upon a man known as "Russian Pete," who slept in an adjoining room, but as Green could not find sufficient evidence to confirm his suspicions, he did not have "Pete" arrested.

A few days after the suspected party went to Virginia, and on the morning of the 28th a Mexican, who was acquainted with Green, saw a man called "Bones" trying to pawn Green's watch. The Mexican immediately started for Silver City informed Green of what he had seen. This strengthened his suspicions, and both he and the Mexican started for Virginia where they arrived at about 2 p.m. Green proceeded at once to the Sheriff's office and made known his business. A search was instantly commenced for "Russian Pete," who soon came in sight of their men, but he, seeing Green and suspecting what was up started off, but was finally ordered by Gregory to halt. "Pete" in answer, raised his pistol, and in not very complimentary terms, said he knew what Green wanted with him and he would not be arrested. Gregory then set off for his horse and a gun, for not expecting the least resistance, he had come unprepared. "Pete" made off and was lost sight of by his pursuers. In a little while, however, he was found, having secreted himself in the old North Potosi tunnel, around which were soon collected Sheriff Mulcahy, several of his deputies and a large number of spectators.

The Sheriff advanced a few steps into the tunnel to hold a parley with the refugee, but was warned not to come too near, when he, no doubt thinking discretion the better part of valor, withdrew. The mouth of the tunnel was kept covered with pistols and shot-guns, and preparations were made to stop the stream of water at its mouth and so drown him out. While this work of damming the tunnel was going on, Pete came to the front, and shot Walter Williams, who was using a pick at the time, through the heart, causing instant death. Additional precautions, and a change in the method of operation were then adopted, an attempt being made to sink down and cave in the top of the tunnel, commencing about 18 feet back from its mouth. Just about this time "Pete" again advanced to the mouth of the tunnel, and seeing no hope of escape, he retreated and shot himself dead. He had fired his revolver in his mouth, the ball passing through the center of the brain. The two bodies were delivered to the coroner and taken to the establishment of Messrs. Wilson & Brown, undertakers.

Williams was a Canadian and thirty-six years old. "Pete" was thirty-eight years old, and a native of Finland. He had the reputation of being a peaceable, quiet, honest man, and his desperate acts are attributed to the influence of drink, he having been on a "bender" a few days previous to his untimely end. The *Tribune* says the affair was one of the most desperate and tragic that has occurred in that city since the bloody days of 1862-3.

WORTH KNOWING.—The *Sacramento Reporter* says: "We have been furnished with the following recipe for expelling moths and destroying their eggs. To get rid of them—1st. Procure shavings of cedar or camphor wood and enclose in muslin bags, which should be distributed freely among the clothes. 2d. Sprinkle among the clothes pimento (allspice) berries, or the seeds of the musk plant. A solution of the acetate of potash in spirits of rosemary, fifteen grains to the pint, will destroy the eggs in woolen cloth. To preserve furs from moths, wash the same with a liquid composed of twelve grains of corrosive sublimate dissolved in one pint of warm water."

THE EARTHQUAKE AT SACRAMENTO.—The *Sacramento Reporter*, says a slight shock of earthquake was felt in that city on the evening of the 24th of July. No casualties were heard of.

ANNUAL ELECTION.—Our Annual Election was going on very peaceably at the time we went to press. When we visited the fourth precinct at three o'clock, 423 votes had been polled.
