Russians Succeeded in Effecting An Advance Along the Railway to the South.

FIGHTING WAS MOST DESPERATE

Endurance of the Men Wonderful-Russian Artillery Fire as Effective as the Japanese.

Russians yesterday effect-The ed an advance along the railevay to the southward. The battle near Liao Yang was resumed in the morning earlier than it began Tuesday. With the first gray of dawn the artillery opened and the firing soonextended along the entire line. The rain ceased during the night and day broke bright and clear,

A balloon ascended from one of the Japanese positions southeast of Llao Yang, making a target for the Russian mortar batteries, but the shells failed to reach it.

Mukden advices say it is rumored there that Gen. Samsonoff has captured two Japanese battalions.

The Japanese are getting around the Russian left flank. Over 500,000 men and 1,000 guns are engaged on both sides. Practically the whole Russian force is on the firing line.

Dispatches from Liao Yang confirm the report of the capture of 46 Japanese guns, which were brought up to the railroad station where Gen. Kuropatkin's train was standing.

The Russians made repeated bayonet advances on the road directly south of Liao Yang, where the Japanese ap-proached from San Quaiship and Tao, shelling the positions in the Russian lines until 4 o'clock in the afternoon, when the engagement, which was gen-eral throughout the south and south eral throughout the south and south-east, narrowed to the main line. The cast, harrowed to the main line. The Japanese advance on the southeast was by way of the Feng Wang Cheng road. Immediately in front of Chlaoeniuan the Japanese stubbornly attempted to occupy a round-topped hill, which was literally shaved by the Russian shells, making repeated attempts the entire day attempted by the sourcestly. day where apparently it was impossible for anything to live. The cannonading continued from this point to the vicini-ty of Wangpaotal until this evening without apparent advantage to either

side. The Japanese dropped shells within two or three miles of the railroad sta-tion and in the plain of Wentshu moun-tain, which is the most important emi-nence around Laao Yang, but the Japa-nese abandoned aggression there on account of the resistance they met. There was cannon fire last night, and this is expected nightly. his is expected nightly.

The cut shows the new bund, or embankment, in the inner harbor at Chemulpo, Korea. It was built by the Japanese and is the scene of great activity. The stores of various kinds piled high in the foreground indicate the importance of this construction. When it was decided to make this Korean city Japan's hase of supplies in the Hermit Kingdom the building of the embankment was at once begun. Large vessels cannot enter the inner harbor, but must remain at the outer anchorage. Cargoes are transferred into sampans, which are poled laboriously into the estuary and unloaded at the bund. The custom house and many large warehouses were also erected by the Japanese.

Considering the scale of the day's op-erations, the number of Russian wounded is apparently small, while the Japanese losses are believed to be great, especially where they were repulsed on the southward. Chinese graves with trees are being leveled about Liao Yang in order not to interfere with the defense.

ARMIES IN A DEATH STRUGGLE. St. Petersburg, Sept. 1.-With the knowledge that the Russian and Jap-anese armies about Liao Yang are locked in a death struggle the tension in St. Petersburg tonight is strained to the utmost. It is believed here that the fight cannot stop short of the crushing defeat of one side or the other. All reports so far are favorable to the Russlans, though the suspension of all news for many hours has been exceedingly trying and has given rise to several rumors, somewhat tempering the earlier enthusiasm.

It is stated officially, however, that the report that the railway and tele-graph have been cut north of Liao Tang is untrue. A member of the gen-eral staff said to the Associated Press at midnight: "I can assure you that up to this hour communication with Liao Yang has not been interrupted. Gen. Kuropatkin has taken particular precautions against any attempt to cut the railway. While it is always possible that a small raiding party might slip through the Russian patrols or that hired Chinese bandits might cut the telegraph, it is a fair supposition, in view of all the facts, that this has not been done."

The highest military authorities here consider that the most critical stage of the battle has not yet been reached

Chefoo, Aug. 31, 11:30 p. m .- (Delayed in transmission).—Severe fighting oc-curred at Port Arthur Aug. 27, when the Japanese, moving from Shuishly-ing, attempted to capture Pulungshan which is south of Shuishlying and west of the railroad. The Japanese made two assaults between 4 and 8 o'clock in ie morning. They were repulsed both times. A prisoner, subsequently taken, places their loss at 1.045 killed and wounded.
