# GIVE WAR DANCE

Unique Preliminary to the Pioneer Celebration on Monday Next.

#### SATURDAY AT SALT PALACE

Will Also Play Ball and Give a Sacred Concert Sunday Afternoon-Monday's Parade.

Palefaces by the thousands are exsected at the Salt Palace Saturday night to witness a genuine war dance y 100 Bannocks from the Fort Hall Indian reservation. The braves will be here for the purpose of taking part in the Pioneer day parade and will come gorgeously bedecked to give a correct representation of Indian life. Sunday afternoon they will give a sacred concert at the same place, both of which will serve as fitting preliminaries to the Pioneer day celebration on Monday, Saturday afternoon the Indians will play a game of baseball with one of the best teams in Salt Lake, music for the event to be furnished by the Indians' brass band, an up-to-date organization.

A feature of Monday's parade will be the Indians, 75 bucks, 25 squaws, and a number of cute, little papeoses. In line will also be survivors of the original Ploneer band in automobiles, Ploneer handcarts, pony express riders, veterans of the Nauvoc Legion, Mormon Battailon, Indian wars, Spanish-American war and United States soldiers. There will also be six brass bands engaged specially for the occasion.

The main portion of the parade will show the historical and industrial growth of the state since its settlement in 1817. At various points in the line handcarts and wagons that took part in the journey across the plains

part in the journey across the plains will be seen, while space will be allowed the pony express riders and others to depict the perils that attended transportation and life generally in the

early days.
Changes since 1847 will be contrasted by floats showing industrial processes of that period and of the present time. One feature of this section of the parade will be the appearance of the first printing press ever brought to Utah. The press will produce facsimites of the first press will produce facsimites of the first press will produce facsimites of the first pressurable ever printed in Utah. first newspaper ever printed in Utah, copies of which will be distributed to copies of which will be distributed to the crowd as fast as they can be run off. The building of the first homes, pioneer agriculture, treating with the Indians, trappers' adventures, home life of the Indians, hunting seenes, etc., all will be portrayed by floats. Many business houses of the city have pre-pared floats showing the advancement made in their particular branches of made in their particular branches of

industry.
As previously announced, the celebration will take place in Liberty park, beginning Monday at 10 a. m. The combeginning Monday at 10 a, m. The coinsmittee in charge expects an attendance of 50,000 persons. In order to guard against accidents during the parade, a "committee of safety" consisting of 200 members, will be named to patrol the line of march.

#### WATER ANALYZED.

#### State Chemist Finds Parley's and City. Creek of Excellent Purity.

An analysis of City Creek water showed the best physical properties. with neutral reaction, and no deleter-ious chemical properties whatever. The total solids per gallon amounted to 16.335 grains consisting of the usual water constituents; the volatile matter per gallon amounted to 2.042 grains; Chlorine, .7 grain; corresponding to sodium chloride, 1.155 grains; organic matter, .025 part per million. The bacteriological examination developed water of examination to the solice of the

These analyses bear out what has been claimed by Salt Lake residents. that the neighboring canyons are fur-nishing water for this city that is pure, sweet and wholesome; and peo-ple from outside desirous of making city their home are bearing this in mind.

#### BROKE HOT SPELL.

Local Weather Report on Benefit of Thundershowers of Last Week.

Weekly crop builtin for week ending Monday, July 17, 1905: During the fore part of the week there was a continuation of the hot and dry weather. A deded change in this condition occurred. lowever, about the 14th, when general thunderstorms occurred over the entire section, accompanied by generous pre-cipitation, amply sufficient to refresh the growing vegetation. Some damage resulted from lodging of heavy grain, due to the high winds that accom-panied the storms, and by the beating nin. Hay in stack also suffered to

ome extent. Grain continued to head and ripen, and was generally in good condition where properly irrigated. Exceptions to this condition occurred over the southern counties, where the chinch bug was reported damaging the crop. Harvesting of grain continued. The yield of arid-land wheat was below the average, but trrigated grain was about the average. Beets were growing rapidly, but some fields were injured by insects. The second crop of alfalfa was being gathered and stacked in the

southern counties, and was making rapid growth throughout the state. Fruit, though damaged to some extent by high winds, was in fair condition. Corn was improving, tasseling in some localities. Potatoes were being mar-keted with good yields. The range re-vived to a marked degree. Stock was in good condition. The supply of irrigation water was replenished
