**SCOUNDRELISM OF STRIKE METHODS**

Strike Called for No Apparent Reason Settled for One Thousand Dollars.

**SIMPLY CASE OF EXTORTION.**

Man Who Got the Money Ordered the Men Out from His Automobile.

Chicago, May 19.—A ray of light was flashed into at least one building trades strike in Chicago. Incidentally, there was allusion to the methods of trades unionism in San Francisco.

These features were presented when the state opened its case against Martin (Skinny) Madden, president of the Associated Building Trades council of Chicago, and his associates, F. A. Pouchett and M. J. Boyle, charged with conspiracy to extort \$1,000 from the Joseph Kleika company, a Chicago concern, against which a strike was called.

As told in court, the strike was called by Madden from his automobile. The boys fell on Nov. 18 for no apparent reason. The job seemed "regular," and Mr. Kleika sent D. L. Frazier, a construction engineer, to investigate. Frazier testified that he saw Boyle, who said the strike had been called because there was a non-union man working on it. When asked how the matter could be settled, he said Kleika would have to see Madden.

Frazier moved Madden had demanded \$1,500 as the price of putting the men back to work. George Andres, a construction engineer, testified that Kleika gave him \$1,000 with which to settle the strike. Andres having approached the former with a statement that it could be done for that sum, Andres said he asked Madden if \$1,000 would settle the strike.

"And what did he answer?" "Bring up the dough," So I went to Kleika, got the check and got ten \$100 bills at the bank. It was night before Madden showed up, and then I offered him the money.

"How am I to know if the strike will be called off if I give you the money?" "I asked him."

Andres said he asked Madden what to do with the money, and Madden told him to throw it on the floor or on the desk. Andres laid it on the desk and invited the labor leader out to have a drink. As they moved out Madden dropped a blotter over the money, seized the pile and shoved it into his pocket.

Next day the strike was called off. On cross-examination by Atty. A. J. Brady of the defense, reference was made to San Francisco.

"Didn't you tell Madden about unions in San Francisco, and didn't you tell him that you had put them out of business there and would do the same thing here?" Andres was asked.

He denied the talk, but denied the threat.

"Did you say to Pouchett that he could make a lot of money if he knew his job and didn't let his men get satisfied with what he was getting?" "No."

"Didn't you tell him that if he did it like you fellows in San Francisco he and his friends could make a barrel of money?" "No."

"Didn't you tell him that out there a man would send in a light room and hand the money to a man in a dark room, so the man who gave the money never knew to whom he handed it?" This and similar questions brought fourth denials.

**ROCHESTER CUMMING DEAD.**

New York, May 20.—Capt. Rochester Cumming, who as a lieutenant on the converted scout ship Harvard, carried the first news of the strength of Cervera's squadron in Santiago harbor, is dead at his home in Englewood, N. J. Capt. Cumming, who in recent years had been in command of Oliver Harriman's private yacht, was sent ashore from the Harvard by Admiral Sampson after Cervera's fleet entered the harbor of Santiago and after a perilous journey, he reported to the American commander the strength of the Spanish naval forces.

Washington, May 20.—An increase of 80 per cent in the amount of imports into the United States from France during the months of February and March last is announced by the bureau of statistics. The total value of imports in February was \$10,000,000 as against \$5,500,000 in February of the preceding year and in March \$11,300,000 as against \$6,500,000 in March of the preceding year. **SOUTH ATLANTIC PILOT CHART.**

Washington, May 20.—The hydrographic office of the United States navy which stands foremost among the world's institutions in the collection and distribution of information regarding navigation has issued a valuable pilot chart of the south Atlantic ocean, covering meteorological conditions, pertaining to navigation, which are of a transitory nature, position of derelicts and other floating dangers, ice movements, storm tracks, direction and force of the winds and the height of barometers and thermometers as well as the ocean currents and the best sailing and steamer routes. This chart is the third of its kind, the others being the North Atlantic ocean and the North Pacific ocean, and is to be issued quarterly. A pilot chart of the Great Lakes is also being prepared.
