FRAGMENTS.

Johns Xmas did not hold court today. This has been a quiet day around the hall of justice.

WHEN THE OLD FOLKS COME

Who Will Help Convey Them to Their Homes?

A Call by the Committee for Vehicles to Meet the Train on Tuesday Night.

The Old Folks go to Ogden tomorrow and their anticipations for a joyful time will be fully realized. That they may experience no inconvenience on their return home, the committee makes a request of the people of Salt Lake. Their wishes are embodied in the following:

The Old Folks' excursion train from Ogden is expected to arrive at the Salt Lake City depot about 7:45 and in addition to the number of street cars which the two companies have kindly promised to be at their disposal on arrival, if the lively, stable, convenient and also furnish a few conveyances to carry some of the more infirm and crippled ones, it would be much appreciated.

The aged veterans will have been at least twelve hours from their homes, and will naturally be tired and weary when they reach the depot. There are scores of old veterans of this noble enterprise, who are anxious to throw in their arms, if they knew what they could do. The committee therefore kindly suggests that in addition to the above, those private families who have carriages, pianos or buggies that can accommodate from one to four or five persons, and who are so that on their immediate arrival, not one aged soul may be left to wend his or her way home on foot in the dark.

The Utah Colony Past and Present—The Students' Good Work.

ANN ARBOR, Mich., July 15, 1893.—It is now nearly two weeks since over eight hundred students received their diplomas from the University of Michigan. Among them were a number of Utah's favored ones. The city presents a different appearance today from that of a short time ago. All is as still as the calm evening, now and then disturbed by a little wave of the "summer breeze" and the few "summer students" that are here have the city to themselves. There are in all nine Utah students here—one of them a lady, Mrs. A. Reynolds, of Salt Lake City. Besides the students there are four ladies and eight children, being fugitives to the colony, which make things agreeable and (at times) lively for us students. We feel rather homesick with our friends and fellow students who were with us the past year now parted from us. Prominent among them is Ann Arbor with happy recollections and with a high ambition in mind. Upon his name he may show two titles—"Bachelor" and "Bachelor of Letters," which he has gained by deep study and the conscientiousness of the true student which characterizes his work and life. We cannot refrain from adding the opinion that he will become one of the great scholars of the "Haskins" class, and that Utah will get much good from his research here. His fellow-students here wish him great success in his great profession.

Mr. D. C. Hildout and C. B. Stewart of Draper, Sam L. King, Thomas John and Jesse Knight of Provo, have also returned to their homes with degrees conferred upon them, and we must say they are a very bright "class."
