LOCAL BRIEFS.

Utah lake is 18 inches lower than it was a year ago at this time.

The Elks will welcome eight new Elks into the coral next Wednesday night.

Ex-Sergt. R. L. Eddington of the police force has been appointed guard at the state prison.

The Utah State Suffrage council will hold an important meeting tomorrow at 2 p. m. in the Exposition office.

There were 30 members of the State Historical society at yesterday's meeting that an indefinite adjournment was taken.

The ladies of the First Presbyterian church have issued invitations for a dinner to be given on the 23rd inst. in the parlors of the new church.

The Zion's Savings Bank & Trust company has just sold a 10x14-10 rods lot at Twelfth South and Eleventh East streets, for \$1,000 to N. J. Hanson.

The name of the new building going up on the site of the old First Methodist church is The Metropole, and it now appears on the heavy white stone entrance.

Hereafter, the Second South street cars that have been running to Twelfth East street will continue on to Mt. Olivet cemetery, to the great relief of visitors to the cemetery.

Miss Josephine Anderson of Denver has been appointed by Gov. McDonald of Colorado as a delegate to the "See America First" conference to be held in this city, Jan. 25.

Chief Hydrographer W. G. Swendsen of the local reclamation bureau has returned from an inspection of the gaging stations of the state. He found the streams pretty well frozen up.

The 25th annual session of the Utah grand lodge of Masons convened this morning in Masonic hall, with a good attendance from over the state. New officers will be elected tomorrow.

City Engineer L. C. Kelsey was in Idaho Falls, Ida., on Saturday, looking after the completion of the sewer system for that city, which he has been installing. The system is just completed and cost \$40,000.

First Sergt. Schmidt of the Twelfth Light battery, and Corporal John F. Noeman of the Nineteenth Light battery at Fort Douglas have been promoted to the first class gunners. This means a gold medal decoration and \$2 added to their monthly pay.

The transfer was recorded yesterday afternoon of the Jordan Narrows electric plant from W. S. McCornick to Manager L. Nunn of the Telluride Power company for \$16,843.25. The plant is of 4,000 horse power capacity, with water rights in the river and adjoining lake.

The following patients left the Groves L. D. S. hospital yesterday: fully recovered, Mrs. Charles Hietman of Bingham; Mrs. C. W. Puzey and Miss Lulu Varley. A daughter of President Ford of West Jordan was taken to the hospital in the afternoon suffering from typhoid fever.

The High school cadets are being given systematic indoor instruction by Captain Webb, professor of military science and tactics at the school. This includes the school as heretofore published. Friends who desire to view the remains may do so at the family residence, 239 west Fifth North, from 10 to 12 o'clock noon on day of funeral.

Burglars entered the Hancock residence of Rev. H. A. Hanson of the English Lutheran church, 329 east Fourth South street, last night, and \$15 was stolen. The family was at the theater at the time, and on returning found the house ransacked. The thief gained entrance by prying open a rear window.

Warden Pratt stated yesterday to several ladies of the Christian Endeavor prison committee, that since the Christmas visitation from the committee with candles and presents for each of the prisoners, the behavior of the inmates of the prison had been unusually good, and very little trouble given. The building contractor says that the changes required to be made will not cost over \$2,000, whereas, a bill is before Congress to appropriate \$150,000 for changes that are imperative in the Chicago postoffice. The Intermountain Scenic Display company of Salt Lake has filed its articles of incorporation in the county clerk's office. Its capital stock is \$25,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$10 each. C. L. Rood is president; Graham F. Pugh, vice president; Fisher Harris, secretary; W. H. Birt, treasurer. The company has purchased the rights for Utah, Colorado, Nebraska, Wyoming, Montana and Idaho to the electrical panorama invented by Joseph W. Fawkes, Jr. The company will do a general advertising and display business.

The coal situation is improving, as the Union Pacific people are now getting more cars than ever into this city. One cause of the same is the fact that at this time of year, freight shipments drop off materially, thus cutting down the demand for consumption on locomotives, as the number of freight trains are reduced. So there is more and more coal for commercial consumption. That coal dealers have learned a severe lesson is evident from the fact that the Cache Junction dealer has placed orders with the Union Pacific Coal company for deliveries beginning in August and ending in January, 1907, and amounting to 3,400 tons.

GOOD GROWING COUNTRY. Glenn's Ferry Produces Garden Truck By Middle of March.

A. E. Haines of Glenn's Ferry, Ida., is in town on route home from a trip of Idaho. He says the vicinity of Glenn's Ferry is the warmest in Idaho, the midsummer temperature running as high as 118 in the shade. Consequently, by the middle of March garden truck is grown in that section, with strawberries by the middle of May, and new potatoes by June 1. Even peaches can be grown there. Boston capitalists have invested money in irrigation schemes at Glenn's Ferry which will bring 25,000 acres under the ditch. Mr. Haines has not been in Salt Lake since 1884, when the population was only 2,000, and the city only an overgrown town.

JAN. 16th
1697—Richard Savag, the "Unhappy Poet," born; died 1735.
1791—Edward Gibbon, historian, author of "The Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire," died; born 1737.
1807—Charles Henry Davis, rear-admiral, U. S. N., born in Hartford; died 1875. Davis served as fleet captain under Dupont at the battle of the Monitor and the Merrimack, and as commander of the Mississippi at the battle of Mobile Bay. He succeeded to the command of the Mississippi in 1862, defeated the Confederate ram Louisiana and several gunboats on May 10 and 11, and was killed by a shot from the Merrimack before Mobile Bay, June 8.
1897—Joel T. Headley, the historian, died at Newburg, N. Y., born 1818.
1898—Right Hon. C. P. Villiers, "Father of the House of Commons," having held a seat continuously from 1832, died in London. General Christopher Coleridge, veteran of the Crimean and Mexican wars, died in Washington; born 1821.
