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His side went there also. Some peo-

Then He could come to the earth and say: "All power is given unto me both in the heavens and on the earth." He had fulfilled His the earth." He had fulfilled His mission, and had received immortal keys and honors and powers as a re-ward of the fulfilment thereof. He shall occupy the highest place among all the sons of God, because He is the firstbern, and has performed the work of the firstborn in the plan of human redemption. He will be ex-alted above every creature, because He was the most obedient of every creature. He will be the greatest, because He was the humblest. He will be the richest, because He was the best. He is the sinless Christ, and therefore He wears the eternal

crown. There is another question that arises here. If men can hear the Gospel in the spirit world, can they obey it fully in the spirit world? Let us look at that a little.
