President Diaz of Mexico Gives History of Its Origin.

Grows Out of Claim Presented by Catholic Church of Upper California Against the Republic.

Mexico City, Sept. 17 .- President Diaz, in his message to congress, says of the Pius claim, now being arbitrated at The Hague:

MINERAL LAND FRAUDS.

Quarter of a Million Acres Said to Bave Been Fraudulently Entered.

Washington, Sept. 17 .- Commissioner Hermann of the general land office said he knew nothing regarding the asser-tion that 250,000 acres of public land of mineral character in California had been taken up by the "dummies" of eastern speculators. The use of "dum-

mics" for this purpose, however, has been resorted to for years by specula-tors, and whenever this evasion of the law had been discovered and proven b investigation the land patents held b them have been cancelled. Mr. Hermann said:

"When parties attempt to obtain title to mineral lands through the stone and timber act or of any settlement laws of the United States, protests should im-mediately be filed with the interior de-partment with a view to contesting and the facts then would be inquired into.
