EDITORIAL NOTES.

According to the coast papers, "The returns at the office of the Supervisor of Census make the population of San Francisco 233,036, inclusive of 20,548 Chinese."

Has Edison ever invented anything? The quadruplex telegraph which he claims as his own, and is thought to be the most valuable thing to which his name has been attached, is now said to be the production of H. C. Nicholson, of Kentucky, and legal proceedings have been instituted to set Edison's patent aside.

Any kind of a fashion will take among a great many ladies providing it is started by an "authority" in such matters. One of the reckless women who, in Paris, are called leaders of fashion, has appeared on the race course at Longchamps, with a bunch of raffles in her bonnet. Since that, watercress, asparagus, and undressed salad have become articles of dress with the American women at the French capital.

Popular "Christian" sentiment is well illustrated by the following paragraph from an eastern paper: "For six days, while the cell of Christine Cox was being decorated with expensive flowers, and he was receiving no end of sympathy and presents, a poor woman was lying in the attic of a tenement house only a few squares away, with her dead babe on an old trunk, because she could not get money enough to bury it. But then, she had never killed anybody."

Belgium has made great progress since the establishment of the kingdom in 1830. The population has increased from about 3,500,000 to 5,500,000, the rate of increase being exactly one per cent per annum. The land in Belgium, as in France, is well divided among the people, there being about 1,140,000 freehold proprietors who possess about 2,419,799 hectares of land, out of a total of 2,945,516. The land is constantly being divided, and, as a consequence, where there is no entail or other hindrance to ownership, the number of landed proprietors is evidently on the increase. In 1876 there were 21 land owners to every 100 inhabitants. This is a "healthy" state of things, and is one of the secrets of the prosperity of the little kingdom.

The *Millennial Star* of July 5th has the following notice, to which the attention of persons in this Territory seeking for information from the Liverpool Office is respectfully directed: "A great many letters are received at this Office, from various parts of Utah, from private individuals. Most of these communications are written with the expectation of a reply from us by mail. In most cases the writers forget to enclose sufficient currency to cover the expense for postage. In consequence of this omission we have necessarily been put to considerable expense. We cheerfully supply legitimate information to those making application for it, but, in future, we would be pleased to have it understood that letters of inquiry from private persons should enclose a sufficient amount to defray the postage of a reply."

UTAH'S INCREASE OF POPULATION.

The Grand Rapids (Michigan) *Times*, a smart, shrewd, and generally impartial journal, has fallen in to the same error as several other papers, in announcing that the census of Utah shows an increase of the non-"Mormon" population of 200 per cent for the last ten years, while the "Mormons" have only increased 45 per cent. No estimate of the relative numbers of the two sections of our population is afforded by the census, which was not designed to show the religious status of the people of the United States. But the *Times* draws its conclusions from an old statement of the "Mormon" population as reported at the late April Conference. No such statement has been published by authority of the Church, and therefore the *Times* started on an unsafe foundation. The statistical report read at the April conference was not perfect, and if it had

been it would not represent the "Mormon" population, because quite a number of children not baptized into the Church to which their parents belong and to which they will in due time become formally attached, were not counted in that report. They are, however, numbered in the census. The *Times* places the "Gentile" population in Utah at 32,000, which is more than double their actual number. Another mistake is the notion of that paper that immigrants to Utah have been "largely" composed of non-believers in the faith. The exact reverse is the truth. The Utah immigration, it is well known, is almost entirely composed of believers in "Mormonism," and that fact is so well recognized that not long ago Secretary Evans made a futile attempt to decrease it by his senile anti-"Mormon" letter to the consuls at foreign ports. The New York papers, too, frequently groan over the large numbers of "Mormon" immigrants that land at Castle Garden.

It is rarely that the *Times* tumbles into such a mass of mistakes as occur in the article to which we have referred, and in this instance its trip is traceable to excess of confidence in an unreliable report of "Mormon" affairs, which the average newspaper account of our beliefs and doings is, almost invariably. The *Times* should take warning by this misstep and beware of anti-"Mormon" statements of "Mormon" matters.

The "Mormon" population is rapidly increasing, not only by foreign immigration but by home immigration, that is, natural increase, and by the time another census is taken our numbers will be likely to astonish, not only the natives but the whole civilized world.

"LIBERAL" LIBERALITY AND CONSISTENCY.

ONE of the most striking characteristics of the so-called "Liberals" of this Territory, apart from their extreme illiberality, is their remarkable inconsistency. In illustration of this we quote two or three paragraphs from the resolutions of the Beaver County "Liberal" Convention. They occur apart, but we place them together to show how much harmony there is between them:

"Whereas the party which have held power in this Territory since its first settlement have denied all exercise of political rights to American citizens who do not worship God according to their peculiar forms and mode of religious faith,

"Be it resolved, that this convention of the Liberals of Beaver County believe that the cause of progress and enlightenment will be best served, and the moral and material interests of the community best promoted, by our candidates for county and precinct office being exclusively chosen from the class of the community who have no connection with the dominant Church,

"Resolved, that we wage war upon no class of the community, and endeavor that we have any wrongs to avenge, but insist upon the right of the majority to choose and elect men to office whom they regard most fit for public position."

It will be seen that these very "Liberal" folks declaim against alleged exclusiveness, and then announce their intention of practicing it. They do this too, on religious grounds. They draw the line on creeds. They wage no war on a class, but they will work exclusively against those who are of the "dominant Church." They have "no wrongs to avenge," yet they assert that a certain party has "denied all exercise of political rights to American citizens," etc. They are angry because a certain party has been "dominant," and yet insist on the right of the majority to elect men to office. This is consistency with a vengeance.

Now what have these malcontents to complain of? Simply that the "Mormons" have been in the majority, and have acted on "the right of the majority to choose and elect men to office whom they regard most fit for public position." That is all. Who has denied these "Liberal" the exercise of any political right? Have they not held as many caucuses and conventions as they chose? fixed up as many tickets as they pleased? resorted to as many contemptible dodges as their tricky souls conceived, even to copying the form of the People's tickets and slipping in a few names of their own to deceive the unwary? had the same rights at the polls as the same number of "Mormons"? They know they have, and yet they cannot get together and pass a few resolutions without lying in the most "Liberal" manner.

Let them get into power and how much liberality will they exhibit? Why their intolerance, exclusiveness and selfish spite stick out in plain sight from their "Liberal" resolutions. Any "Mormon" who by actual vote or the withholding of his ballot from his own cause, aids such enemies to truth and honor in their attempts to force their way into office, is a traitor to his friends, and deserves to be brought under "Liberal" dominion. It is the duty of every member of the People's Party to unite with the body in keeping such "Liberal" frauds from touching the business or handling the funds of any city or county in the Territory of Utah.

Immense Democratic Ratification.
 The great democratic ratification meeting occurred at the Academy of Music last evening. Tilden presided and spoke briefly. Most of the celebrities announced to be present, including McClellan and Seymour, wrote letters of regret. The *Times* summarizes thus: The democratic meeting last night at the Academy of Music, Irving Hall, Wilson Hall and adjoining streets, did not altogether meet the anticipation of an imposing demonstration. The Academy of Music was filled, but the attendance at the other meetings was small, averaging about 200. While the meeting was called to ratify the nomination of Hancock and English, all references to these persons were received with indifference, while Tilden met with a tremendously enthusiastic welcome, and was again and again made the object of prolonged applause. The Randall, Ewing, Randolph, Tucker and Senator Jones, of Florida, Tucker's speech had a strong anti-bellum flavor, and evidently pleased the audience better than any of the others. The *Tribune* says: Tilden presided and struggled through a very short address, in which he set up the standard cry once more, and insisted on the importance of a change in the party at the head of the government. He shows much agitation and pitiful physical weakness. John Kelly went no letter and Tammany Hall took no part in the affair. The *World* says, fifteen or twenty thousand were present. The *Herald* calls it a monster meeting.

The *Sun* places the number at 25,000. The *Star* says it was one of the largest mass meetings held here for a dozen years.

The Fraud Cry from Alabama.
 The *Tribune's* Washington special says: Private letters from Alabama republicans convey the following intelligence in regard to the prospects at the State election next Monday. The whole northern tier of counties is claimed, and apparently with good reason, by the greenbacks. This is the section from which Lowe, the present greenback congressman, comes, as the greenbacks of that section are themselves expert at building and counting, nothing is to be feared by them from the democrats. In the black belt, which is the republican stronghold, and in which several counties give large republican majorities, only two counties were permitted at the last election to have their ballot fairly counted. There are indications that the democratic counting machinery will be applied to these counties, or at least to one of them on Monday. The canvassing of the vote, it will be remembered, has been taken out of the hands of the local authorities and vested in a board, the members of which are appointed by the governor. The object of this law was almost undisguisedly to enable the democrats to overrule the republican majorities by means of fraudulent counting.

The *Herald's* London special, speaking of the Parliamentary proceedings says: When Lord Hartington rose to give further information that he had received a pin could have been heard falling. There was little comfort in what he had to say, on the contrary the restoration of slavery among members was that affairs were in a worse state than the Government admitted. Many persons acquainted with Indian affairs expressed their doubts as to whether success should lead to a general rising of the clans, and eventually to an uprising in India itself, which would be more difficult to suppress than the mutiny of the sepoy troops.

Grand Council of Knights Templars.
 Preparations on a magnificent scale have been made for the reception of the Knights Templars, on their triennial convocation, beginning August 18th. It is certain the gathering will be the largest and most noteworthy ever held and the decorations are in keeping with the expected grand outpouring of delegates. The committee in charge have already assigned hotels, camps, and boarding houses to 30,000 knights and 12,000 women. Hundreds of mess posters are yet out and all will not be before the 31st inst. There are yet to be assigned 20,000 people, and even those not Masons can secure apartments upon application to the committee, if endorsed by a Sir Knight. It is known that the procession will number 18,000 to 20,000. The erection of the temple arches and grand encampment have been commenced. One hundred thousand invitations have been issued to a grand ball at the exposition building. One thousand three hundred and eighty-nine tents are erected in the camp and 7,200 people will be accommodated in them. Four thousand dollars in prizes will be awarded for drilling, firework and calcium and electric lights will be a feature of each night's celebration.
