

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THE PRESIDENT'S RETURN.—Owing to the bad condition of the roads, in consequence of the late storm, the President and his party stopped at Payson last evening, where a meeting was held, Presidents Brigham Young and Geo. A. Smith addressing the congregated Saints. At half-past eight this morning the party left Payson, reaching Provo in time for dinner. Should the roads be in sufficiently good condition, the President and those accompanying him expect to reach the city tomorrow afternoon.

THE CULLOM BILL.—A telegram received with our usual press dispatches, informs us that it is generally believed in Washington that the protests against the passage of the Cullom Bill will have no effect in the Senate, and that the amendments of the Senate Territorial Committee will be adopted by that body and concurred in by the House.

RETURNED.—We yesterday had a very pleasant visit from our accomplished artist friend, C. R. Savage, Esq., who has just returned from his trip with President Young to Southern Utah and the Colorado. He tells us he would not give a thousand dollars for the experience gained during his few weeks' absence from home. A large number of carriages followed her remains to the cemetery.
