The Elks will hold their annual election this evening. There is something of a contest for the office of exalted ruler.

There will be a meeting of stenographers in Landrum's hall Friday evening next to form an organization for educational and social purposes.

Great Salt Lake has risen 15 inches since the middle of November last, when the level began to rise, and in the last two weeks the rise has been four inches.

Special services will be held Good Friday next in St. Mark's cathedral from noon until 3 p. m., and there will be an address by Bishop Moreland of Sacramento.

Dr. Henry Lamotte has returned from an absence since last fall from this city. He has been in the east, and while away was quite ill with pneumonia.

M. H. Walker has just selected a handsome skylight design for his new east South Temple street residence. It represents a grape trellis designed by a Minneapolis artist, and will cost \$2,500.

Manager Woolley of the Z. C. M. I. grocery department says that their sales of California olive oil are five times what they were one year ago, and looks for a rapidly increasing sale of the article in this part of the country.

State Supt. Nelson has distributed among the children of the city and county schools 50 letters from London, Eng., schoolchildren, which are to be answered by the Salt Lake children. The London letters are descriptive of London and its schools, and are well written.

Rev. W. H. Williams, known as the drummer evangelist, lectured last night in the Second Methodist church, on "The Last Trump With the Tiger." The speaker's theme was the time when he was "having a roaring old time," and he detailed with graphic earnestness how he overcame his thirst for drink.

There will be a summer normal school held at the state university at the close of the spring term, lasting two weeks from June 6. Rev. Dr. J. H. Vincent, the noted originator of the Chautauqua system, and other prominent instructors will be secured, and the session made a most profitable one.

Special Lenten services are being held this week at St. Mary's cathedral, and for three days, beginning with today, "Tenebrae" will be celebrated at 7 a. m., with mass at 8 o'clock. The bishop officiates at pontifical high mass tomorrow, when the sacred oil will be blessed; and the baptismal font will be blessed on Saturday.

W. H. Rowe is in town from Rockledge county. He reports the bottom gone out of the roads, and a promised boom in the boat building industry. He says there is a noticeable rise in the lake, and there has been such a heavy precipitation in his part of the state, that good crops are insured for the coming season.

POLITICAL STRAWS.

Democratic and Republican officials of the city administration are in conference almost daily on the division of patronage for the city offices. It has been agreed to divide the clerkships equally between the two parties and the necessary changes will be made if possible next Friday, April 1. The great majority of the present employees being Republicans, the new agreement means that quite a number will have to go to make room for Democratic applicants.

A meeting was held yesterday, attended by the mayor, Councilmen Ferguson and A. J. Davis, of the waterworks committee, and Supt. Hines, at which the waterworks department was discussed as to employees. The result of the conference was not made known.

Tomorrow evening is the time set for the holding of Republican primaries to elect delegates to the state convention, which is to elect delegates to the national convention. Interesting contests are looked for in many of the primaries between the Kearns and anti-Kearns forces. The latter are led by former Congressman George Sutherland, and the result tomorrow evening will prove a worthy test of strength.

The Republican national-delegate primaries will be well out of the way before the Democrats enter the field.
