onable time fixed in accordance with sonable time fixed in accordance with engineering conditions, in order to prevent the speculative holding of undeveloped sites; that a small annual mileage and acreage charge be paid during construction for the same reason; that a reasonable annual charge in proportion to the electrical output, nominal amount at the outset and gradually increasing by moderate increments in successive five-veer periods be paid. successive five-year periods, be paid after operation begins, with reasonable deductions on account of other than national forest land used by the plant or forming part of the watershed, and in order to encourage the building of storage reservoirs on account of water storage reservoirs on account of water rage reservoirs, on account of water storage by the permitee; that timber cut or destroyed in construction be paid for at a reasonable stipulated price; that the plant be operated continuously that the plant be operated continuously up to a reasonable stipulated fraction of its full epacity, in order to prevent artificial searcity and the resulting high prices to consumers; that power be sold to the United States, when requested, at as low a price us to any other consumer; that the permit shall not be transferred, since the transfer of government contracts is expressly-prohibited by statute, that the permites must use reasonable precautions, to prohibited by statute, that the permiter inust use reasonable precautions, to protect the forest by fire-fighting, etc.; that the permit shall terminate at the end of 50 years, but may then be renewed on such conditions as the government shall then fix, but that in fixing them neither the permit itself, nor the franchise, stock nor bonds of the permitee shall be considered, but only the actual value at that time or hivethe actual value at that time or phys-ical works constructed under the per-mit, this in order that future genera-

ins, this in order that future genera-tions may not be burdened to pay divi-dends on inflated securities.

These permits are issued under the authority of a specific statute (act Feb. 15, 1801, 31 stat 730 p.) The at-torney-general has expressly given his opinion that the statute empowers the government to impove the construction charges and other conditions contained. sarges and other conditions contained in the permit (opinious of attorney-gen-eral, vol. 28, p. 421) and the United States circuit court for Colorado has by express order directed the receivers of the Las Animas Power company to pay the charge and sign the permit. The administration of this statute, so far as national forests are concerned, was transferred to the department of agriculture by the act of Feb. 1, 1905 (3) stat. p. 28), but still remains in the interior department, so far as reserved public lands and national parks are concerned.

The case is that of Joseph C. Pinnell, clerk of the United States circuit court at London, Richmond, Caffett aburg, Jackson and Covington, Kentucky. In the Finnell case the attornoy-general appealed from the action of the auditor and asked disallowances of the mileage if the comptroller agreed that it was improperly charged. The auditor is now reversed.

Mr. Pinnell admitted that if he was a "separate and independent clerk at each place of holding court," he was not entitled to mileage, but in that event claimed maximum emoluments from each court ladgendent of any other court. This is a remarkable exception to the general law and practise governing federal court clerks in the law's construction and practise as to the appointment of United States courts in Kentucky. "When is a cierk some clerks?" is decided in Mr. Finnell's favor and his appointment to all five offices, contenty to the practise claswhere, is upheld as valid.
