MANY WATCH GAME OF CHANCE.

Drawing Proceeded With After Com-
missioner Richards Read the
President's Proclamation.

(Special to the "News.")

Provo, Aug. 17.—The crowds com-
menced to gather this morning at 8
o'clock at Proctor academy to witness
the drawing of names for quarter sec-
tion homesteads on the Uintah Indian
reservation. By 9 o'clock the hour an-
nounced for the drawing there were
2,000 in attendance. Among those pres-
ent were a large number of govern-
ment clerks, and other employees, Mayor
Royance, Supt. Railways, Principal
Goodwin and Postmaster Cline.

ENVELOPES ARRIVE.
Envelopes containing the names of
applicants from Grand Junction, Price
and Vernal were brought in and with
those from Provo, placed on the platform
ready to be dumped into the big box
from which the drawing was to be
made.

BOYS ON HAND.
Nine bright boys, selected by Supt.
Paulings of the public schools and
Principal Goodwin of the Proctor acad-
emy, were lined up on the platform to
draw the numbers, the first three to
draw names today, the second three
tomorrow, and the last three on the
final day of the drawing. The names
of the boys in the order in which they
will draw were, Arnold Rawlings, Ly-
man Noyes, Earl Gillespie, Walter
Williams, Clarence Peterson, Hoyt Ray,
Arthur Goodwin, Earl Dusenberry,
Raymond Peterson.

Rules That Governed The Drawing.

The committee appointed by the sec-
retary of the interior, in accordance
with the proclamation of the president,
dated July 14, 1905, to conduct the draw-
ing to determine the order in which
homestead entries shall be made on the
Uintah Indian reservation in Utah, met
to enter upon the performance of their
duties. Present: William A. Rich-
ards, commissioner of the general land
office, president, and Irving Howbert
and John Dorn, the other members
thereof. After discussion and dis-
cussion of the matter, it is ordered
by the committee that the method of
conducting said drawing shall be as
follows, to-wit:

PROVO BOY WAS FIRST.
Roy Daniel, a Provo boy 21 years of
age, was the first to draw a name from
the box, and he drew the first number.
He is a young ranchman and said to
have in him the kind of material that
will make a good homesteader. The

shall then be consecutively numbered,
cards bearing corresponding numbers
shall be placed in a box, from which
they shall be drawn by clerks in the
government service, who will distrib-
ute the boxes of envelopes bearing
numbers corresponding with those upon
the cards drawn throughout the draw-
ing box, the top of which having been
removed for that purpose. What all
the envelopes shall have been placed in
the drawing box, the top shall be re-
placed and securely fastened, after
which, before and at frequent inter-
vals during the drawing, the box shall
be revolved sufficiently to insure a thor-
ough mingling of the envelopes.
Fourth—From a group of nine youths
of good character, under the age of 21
years and not qualified to make a
homestead entry, the committee shall
select by lot three sets of three such
to be employed Aug. 17, 18 and 19.
Cards numbered from 1 to 9 shall be
placed in a box from which they shall
be drawn by these youths, who shall be
employed and take their stations at the
box, according to the numbers drawn.
Numbers 1, 2 and 3 shall be employed
upon Aug. 17, taking their stations at
the drawing box, according to the num-
bers drawn. It shall also be deter-
mined by lot which one of the boys
shall draw the first envelope, who
shall thereupon remove the covering of
the aperture at which he is stationed
and take from the box an envelope,
which he shall hand to a member of
the committee other than the president,
who will cause it to be numbered and
then open it, take out the enclosed
card and cause the same number to be
stamped thereon and read the name
and place of residence inscribed there-
on, and the same to the other such
members, who will inspect and verify
them and pass the envelope and cards
to the president of the committee, who
will publicly announce the number of
the card and the name and residence
contained thereon. The box next in
number will then draw another en-
velope, which will be opened and read
in the same manner. The third box
will be similarly disposed of, after
which the box will be revolved suffi-

ciently to present the side next in num-
ber, from which the boys will draw en-
velopes in their order. This course will
be followed until all cards have been
drawn and read to the public, after
which this form of public announce-
ment will be discontinued. The order
of drawing and numbering the en-
velopes and the identification slips will
be continued until 3,772 names have
been drawn, after which such details
as in the judgment of the committee are
not essential to the fairness and integ-
rity of the drawing may be varied by
the committee, but all of the remaining
names shall be taken out and numbered.
Fifth—The first envelope drawn and
the identification slip which it con-
tains shall be numbered 1, and the
number, name and address upon the
card shall be entered upon a typewrit-
ten list and the card and envelope de-
livered to the commissioner of the
general land office. The envelopes and
cards subsequently drawn shall be con-
secutively opened, numbered and dis-
posed of in like manner. The first
sheet shall be headed: "To make entry
August 23, number 1 to 111, inclusive,"
and shall contain 55 names. The second
sheet shall contain 55 names. The
third sheet shall be headed: "To make
entry Aug. 29, numbers 112 to 222, in-
clusive," and this order shall be fol-
lowed until the typewritten lists are
completed. As fast as prepared a sheet
containing a copy of this typewritten
list shall be posted upon a bulletin
board for public inspection. Five thou-
sand and seven hundred and seventy-two
names shall be drawn during the three
days, Aug. 17, 18 and 19, divided be-
tween those days as nearly equal as
possible. At the conclusion of each
day's drawing, or at any time when the
drawing is adjourned temporarily, the
drawing box shall be closed, wrapped
and sealed and opened only when the
drawing is resumed. During the per-
iod of adjournment or recess during
the day and at night a sufficient guard
of employees of the general land office
shall be left in charge of the drawing
box.

REIMBURSEMENT IS ANOTHER SNAG.

Peace Plenipotentiaries Wrestled
This Morning Over the War
Expenses Invoice.

NO AGREEMENT WAS REACHED

Article Nine Proves to be a Real
Stumbling Block for M. Witte
And Associates.

TEMPORARILY LAID IT ASIDE.

Peace Commissioners Discussed the
Little Bill and Then Concluded to
Pass on to Next Section.

Portsmouth, N. H., Aug. 17.—
The peace plenipotentiaries ad-
journing for luncheon at 12:30
o'clock having spent the entire
morning discussing article No. 9,
which, it is believed, includes the
question of Japan's reimbursement
for the cost of the war. No agree-
ment was reached and the commis-
sioners temporarily laid it aside and
proceeded to discuss the following
article.

Portsmouth, N. H., Aug. 17.—The
peace conference began at 9:50 o'clock
this morning. The envoys were served
breakfast at the naval stores building
preceding the session.
The peace plenipotentiaries, who have
alternately sweltered and chilled, shiv-
ered and been soaked, seemed in fine
spirits when they started from the
hotel today.
Most of the Japanese mission were
so busy in preparing cables last night
that they were, in consequence, a lit-
tle behind the regular time in getting
down stairs this morning. It was 9:50
before Mr. Takahira, followed by Baron
Komura, and M. Sato, came down the
veranda and received the usual respect-
ful greetings from the guests who in-
variably gather to see them off.
The Russian envoys were half way to
the navyyard when the Japanese set
out.
