## SAOON REGULATION AT KAYSVILLE MORE RIGID

(Special Correspondence)

KAYSVILLE, Davis Co., Sept. 30.—The Kaysville city council has passed a new ordinance by which saloon keepers have been increased and regulations made more stringent.

Saloons must hereafter pay a license of \$200 per year. Minors, women, or habitual drunkards cannot buy liquor. All pool tables, gaming tables, chairs, etc., are to be removed from the saloon and not allowed therein. This law will go into effect Jan. 1, 1910; the city council providing for a fine of \$100 to those who violate it, to take effect immediately. Saloons can open at 6 a.m. and must close at 10 p.m. The ordinance also contains other stringent measures.

### POLICE COURT CASES.

OGDEN, Oct. 1.—Judge Murphy of the municipal court, had the usual number of offenders before him yesterday.

K. Hallbrook and Slim Collins, both found guilty to drunkenness. The former was given \$5 or five days and "Slim," because of his frequent attendance at court, was given 10 days straight.

George Riley, a half-breed Indian, plead not guilty to the charge of petit larceny. It was claimed by the state that two men had taken the overcoat belonging to a passenger seated in front of them. When the gentleman left his seat he failed to go outside on the platform. The two men took the overcoat and put it in a suitcase. When nearing the station at Kaysville, the owner of the coat accused them of the theft and in order to clear themselves they threw the suitcase out of the car window. When the train stopped at Kaysville one of the men went after the suitcase and notified the police and the fellow that went after the coat was arrested by Officer Thompson. The other got away. He was tried in Justice Galley's court, found guilty and fined \$50 or 50 days in jail.

Estate Valued at \$90,000 Bequeathed To Wives and Thirteen Children.

LOGAN, Cache Co., Oct. 1.—The will of the late Moses Thatcher, disposing of an estate valued at \$90,000, was filed for probate today with the clerk of the First district court. One-third of the estate goes to his wife, Mrs. Lettie A. Thatcher.

To his wife Georgina Snow Thatcher is given \$4,000 for the purchase of a home, which reverts to her children at her death.

Another \$4,000 is given to Mrs. Kate T. Christensen, an adopted daughter.

The remainder of the estate is to be divided among the following children or their heirs: Mrs. Ida T. Angton (deceased), Moses Thatcher, Jr.; Mrs. Emma T. Jeppson, Leonidas Thatcher, George F. Thatcher, Preston A. Thatcher, Lettie Vida Thatcher, Kar-

ma Thatcher, Clayton Thatcher, Floyd C. Thatcher, Abby Snow Thatcher, Elton Snow Thatcher and Arthur Snow Thatcher, Charles Thatcher, whose mother, Mrs. Lydia Ann Clayton Thatcher, is dead, does not share in the estate, as but it is bequeathed to her.

As the oldest daughter, Mrs. Ida Thatcher Lazarus, is dead, her portion reverts to her children.
