SALOON REGULATION AT KAYSVILLE MORE RIGID

(Special Correspondence.)
KAYSVILLE, Sept. 28.—The city council has passed a new liquor law, by which saloon licenses have been increased and regulations made more stringent. Saloons must hereafter pay a license of \$200 per year. Minor women, or habitual drunkards cannot buy liquor. All pool tables, gaming tables, chairs, etc., are to be removed from the saloons, and not allowed to be used for any purpose. The ordinance takes effect Jan. 1, 1910; the changes providing for license advance, etc., is to take effect immediately. Saloons cannot open at 6 a. m. and must close at 10 p. m. The ordinance also contains other stringent measures.

TRAIN THIEF CAUGHT.

KAYSVILLE, Sept. 28.—While riding on the train in a chair car two men planned to steal an overcoat belonging to a passenger seated in front of them. When the gentleman left his seat for a minute to go outside on the platform, the two men seized the overcoat and put it in a suitcase. When reaching the station at Kayville the owner of the coat accused them of the theft. In order to clear themselves they threw the suitcase out of the car window. When the train stopped at Kayville one of the men went after the suitcase. The owner notified the police and the fellow that went after the coat was arrested by Officer Thompson. The other got away. He was tried in Justice J. H. Smith's court, found guilty and fined \$50 or 30 days in jail.

SEWER PROTESTANTS.

PROVO, Oct. 1.—A meeting of protestants and others interested in the controversy over the sewer in sewer district No. 11 met last night in the courthouse in response to a call issued by Judge John H. Milner, who has taken an active part in behalf of the protestants. Judge Milner was elected chairman and John Saxey secretary. The question of cost of the sewer project, etc., was discussed, and more particularly the question of the terms under which the state mental hospital is to be permitted to connect with the sewer. Councilman Newell of the sewer committee informed the meeting that the committee has not yet been able to get a conference with the state board of insanity on the question, but expected to do so this week. After an extended discussion a committee of five was appointed, on motion of J. E. Armistead, which committee will ask the city council committee to make a proposition in the state board of insanity that it pay \$10,000 for the purpose of using the sewer. This amount, or whatever amount may be collected, will be used in the construction of the sewer and deducted from the cost assessed against the property owners who will be taxed for the construction of the sewer. The committee are: John H. Milner, John Saxey, Royal Woolley, Thomas Boardman and Hyrum Hatton.
