LUCKY DUTCHMAN
ARRIVES IN CITY

Fred Schrott Brings Encouraging News From New York.

BLACKHORSE GREAT DISTRICT

Stock of Amalgamated Nevada Mines and Power Company Selling Readily in East.

Fred Schrott, familiarly known to his friends as the "Lucky Dutchman," arrived in the city this morning from New York City.

Mr. Schrott says he left H. S. Woolley in the eastern metropolis hard at work and meeting with the best of success. Both men were in the east in connection with the negotiation of the Amalgamated Nevada Mines and Power Company, the stock of which is now quoted on the New York and Boston exchanges.

The Amalgamated Nevada Mines and Power Company was organized about 90 days ago under the state laws of Arizona with an authorized capital of 2,000,000 shares of a par value of \$5 each. The company's properties are located in the Blackhorse mining district and embrace a number of acres of placer ground besides about 60 lode claims as well as the properties of the Osceola Gravel company and various other options and pieces of property.

Mr. Schrott will probably start for Elly on his way to Blackhorse within the next few days. In discussing this section this morning he said "Our ground embraces most of the choice properties of the district and eventually we expect to have the biggest gold mine in the state. The Osceola Gravel company took out big money until their water supply gave out and there is still plenty of gold on the property. In our case there is no danger of the water supply giving out as we have piped it to the scene of operations so there is no chance of seepage such as was the case of the trouble with the Osceola people. We have a shaft down 110 feet on the San Pedro property and developments to date are most encouraging. I am satisfied that the Blackhorse district has a great future both as regards quantity and quality of the ore and as soon as we get money enough we will make the Amalgamated Nevada Mines and Power company one of the biggest, if not the biggest thing in the state."

ON CHANGE.

Day Was Fairly Active—Sales Divided Between Utah and Nevada Stocks.

This morning's session on the floor of the local exchange was fairly active and the trading fully up to the average of the past week or so. Transactions were about equally divided between the Utah and Nevada stocks, May Day being perhaps the feature of the morning. This stock opened at 19 1/2, the opening sale being at that figure. As low as 18 was reached, the last sale on the open board being at 19 cents.

WORK TO BE COMMENCED.

Sierra Madre Mining Company Has Decided on Immediate Development.

The Sierra Madre Mining company of Ogden filed a copy of its articles of incorporation with the secretary of state today. The company is incorporated for \$500,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$1 each. Of the total capitalization 300,000 shares have been subscribed and 200,000 shares are placed in the treasury as treasury stock to be sold when necessary arises for the interest of the corporation.

L. C. Murphy of Salt Lake is named as president; Angus Kennedy of Ogden, treasurer; Harry S. Harper of Salt Lake, secretary. The company will have a board of directors, with Albert Selwengood and Ella Wingrove, constitute the board of directors. The company owns the Silver Gleam, Mountain Queen, Treasure Vault, Wellington and Pinewood Park lode claims located in the Sierra Madre district, Boxelder county.

A meeting of the directors of the company was held in Ogden a few days ago at which plans were perfected for commencing work on the property at once. Supplies have been purchased and a gang of men will be put to work this week. The property of the company contains several lodes of copper, silver and lead ore and also has a large body of high grade iron ore which is valuable for fluxing.

MANHATTAN HAS
GREAT FUTURE

Opening of Sulphides in Indian Camp Shaft Hailed With Satisfaction.

PERMANENCY NOW ASSURED.

Ledge Stands Almost Vertical and Values Are Increasing With Depth.

Manhattan, Nevada, Dec. 3.—No find made in the west end of the camp is the equal in importance with that made two weeks ago on the property of the Indian Camp Manhattan company, unless it be the strike made a day later on the estate of the Stray Dog Manhattan company. That sulphides would obtain at depth in the Manhattan ore zone has always been contended by the great majority of persons who have made a study of the formation and ledge systems of this district, but their assertions have not always been given credence by the doubters, and have ever been derided by the camp's detractors. The opening up, therefore, of a body of sulphide ore in the Indian camp shaft is hailed with satisfaction by the faithful as establishing the district's future. Incidentally, the doubters now have a monument to tie to.

VALUES INCREASE WITH DEPTH.

Since the big Indian Camp ledge was caught on its dip west at a depth of 150 feet in the shaft, it has been followed down for more than 20 feet and with each foot of depth gained there has been a marked increase in the percentage of sulphides and an inconsiderable increase in gold values. When first entered the ore body held an average grade of \$30 to the ton and is now breaking at better than \$40 the ton. The ledge is standing almost vertical, and judging from its present position, will not leave the shaft for at least 20 feet more of depth. In some cases it has been penetrated, a station will be cut and a crosscut run through the ledge to both hanging and foot wall, following which drifting will begin and ultimately stoping will be begun. The Indian camp has been considered one of the corners of the camp since the early days, and its development has always been watched with interest and anticipation by that portion of the mining public which has ever had faith in Manhattan mining propositions. The sulphide character of the ore now being extracted insures the permanency of ledge and precious metal values to great depth, and stamps the property as a regular producer.

MINE IN EMBRYO.

In the ledge system crossing the Yellow Horse estate are found the mineral characteristics which indicate a mine in the embryonic state and which augur well for the location of permanent pay values as soon as the solid ore zone is well entered. At a depth of 90 feet the Yellow Horse shaft is in a four foot ore body of a solid and permanent nature, and at a depth of 100 feet the deposit is to be crosscut and drifted in search of a pay shoot. From the highly mineralized ledge in which it is being mined, success is reasonably assured. At the 50-foot level a crosscut is being run to catch a ledge paralleling the main vein. This ledge outcrops further up the hill than the latter, and where tested at surface has yielded satisfactory assays and panings. Gold values are secured as high as \$14.60 to the ton, the quartz, when broken open, not infrequently showing gold in the free state. In the future, when the management has two sources from which to mine shipping ore once the permanent zone is entered.

Porphyritic quartz is coming into the shaft on Xmas ground at a depth of 140 feet, and the ledge in which it is being sunk is dipping toward a parallel ledge 16 feet to the west. Conditions in the bottom of the shaft indicate that the ledges will join at depth and become a single deposit of a high grade ore. Sinking will continue until their point of juncture is reached when the body will be cross-cut and drifted on.

NEW EQUIPMENT DECIDED ON.

Ione Mining Company in Park Valley Gives Good Promise.

Operations on the property of the Ione Mining company in the Park Valley mining district are progressing in a highly satisfactory manner, according to Manager P. W. Madsen.

Mr. Madsen says the company has just completed the patenting of its ground, consisting of an entire section and is planning to inaugurate an immediate campaign of development work. Plans for the installation of a water power plant are being perfected and electric drills and other up-to-date mining machinery are being added to the mine's equipment.

The property is said to be looking very well and the management is well satisfied with the results obtained to date.

PREPARING RICH SHIPMENTS.

Mabel Mining Co. Will Enter Local Market With Car of \$5,000 Ore.

Three more men were yesterday sent down to the property of the Mabel Gold Mining company in the Blackhorse mining district, Nevada, to go to work at the mine.

This is the property upon which some months ago are showing the phenomenal value of \$100.75 to the ton was encountered. It is hardly to be expected that there is any very considerable quantity of this ore, there has been little if any development work done since the find and nothing has come up to improve the existence of more of the same quality. out the Weatherly Murphy lease on the south half of the Weatherly claim next to the January and February claims, and which runs within 40 feet of the big strike on the February. The lease has yet sixteen months to run, and Mr. Joseph is anxious to get it. He awaits himself and the others who went in with him. Twenty feet of ore is exposed at a depth of 60 feet, while the grade is not high, it is all that could be expected at that depth. A belt compressor is to be installed and a belt and hoist will be operated by electrical power.
