PROHIBITING FEMALES FROM SERVING

IN SALOONS.

Be it ordained by the City Council of Salt Lake City; That every person who employs any female to serve in the selling, giving away or other disposition or delivery of spirituous, vinous or malt liquors in any saloon or place in said city in which such liquors or any of them are so disposed or delivered to be drunk on the premises where so sold or otherwise disposed of, shall for each and every such offense, upon conviction thereof, be punished by fine not exceeding ninety-nine dollars or by imprisonment in the City Jail not exceeding ninety days, or by both such fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the court; and every female so tion of the court; and every female so employed and serving shall for each employed and serving shall for each and every such offense, upon conviction thereof, be punished by fine not exceeding ninety-nine dollars or by imprisonment in the City Jail not exceeding ninety days or by both such fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the court.

BY AUTHORITY. AN ORDINANCE LICENSING AND REGULATING BILLIARD

AND POOL TABLES AND PIN AND

BALL ALLEYS. SECTION 1.—Be it Ordained by the City Council of Salt Lake City: That no erson shall keep for use in any public lace in said city any billiard or pool table or tables, or any pin or ball alley or nine or ten pin alley or alleys or the runway or runways of either thereof, in or on which games are played, with-

out first obtaining a license and paying a tax therefor, as hereinafter provided. SEC. 2.—Licenses contemplated by the preceding section may be issued by the City Recorder to any person pre-senting a written application therefor, stating in such application the name of the applicant, the number and kind of tables win or ball allege, or nine or top tables, pin or ball alleys or nine or ten the same. But no such license shall be issued until payment has been first made therefor into the City Treasury, at the rate of forty dollars per annum for each and every such table, or at the rate of forty dollars per annum for each and every pin or ball alley or nine or ten pin alley, and the runway thereof, specified in said application.

SEC. 3.—Every person who keeps for use in any public place in said city any kind of table or tables on which gaming for money, or the representation thereof, is allowed; or who keeps for use in any public place in said city any billiard or pool table or tables, or any pin or ball alley, or nine or ten pin al-

pin or ball alley, or nine or ten pin al-ley or alleys, or the runway or run-ways of either thereof, in or on which games are played, without first obtain-ing a license therefor, as hercinbefore provided; or who permits any such bil-liard or pool table or tables, or any such pin or ball alley or nine or ten pin such pin or ball alley or nine or ten pin alley or alleys, or the runway or runways of either thereof, to be used on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday; shall, for each and every such offense, upon conviction thereof, be punished by fine not exceeding ninety-nine dollars, or by imprisonment in the city jail not exceeding ninety days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, at the discretion of the court.
