It leveloped that many of the producers f small fruits have been using different of small fruits have been using different kinds of boxes, many using double case boxes, that contained only 24 boxes instead of 30. The single cases contain 15 boxes and the double cases should all contain 30 boxes. The se-curing of the beat markets for the fruits grown in this county was also given some consideration, as was also given some consideration, as was also the various qualities of fruits grown here. It was very evident at the meeting that the association is going to be of vast benefit to the fruit grows of this section.

The man who had made such a desperate attempt to do away with himself is still able to talk and says his name is julius Thompson.
