JUAREZ, MEXICO. STAKE ACADEMY OPENED.

Impressive Ceremonies Taken Part in By Mexican Officials. Special Correspondence.

Colonia Juarez, Chihuahua, Mexico, March 26.—The Juarez Stake academy was officially opened March 20 and the occasion was celebrated in a rousing manner. The centennary of the birth of Benito Juarez, the Wasnington of Mexico, March 21, had originally been selected as the date for the great event of the opening, but on account of the Mexican officials desiring to celebrate that day in the native town of Casas Grandes, were asked to meet on the 20th that they might be present. manner

President lyins and Principal Wilson met the Jefe Politico and his official par-ty at Casas Grandes and escorted them into the city. The academy sliver band, looking splendid in their new uniforms, struck up the patriotic national hymn as the official party neared the building and the long lines of students between which the party with bared heads marched to the entrance, made the air resound with loud "vivas." Inside, the large assem-bly hall was soon filled with an ex-pectant addence. The official announcement of the open-ing of the academy by the Jefe Polutco was followed by a nearty applause within and a loud demonstration without. Pa-triotic speeches were interspersed with stirring music by the choir, band and or-chestra, all under the most able direc-tion of Prof. A. J. Done. All enjoyed the music and the Mexican officials especial-ly were loud in praise of it. The singing of the Mexican national hymn was im-pressive. The first five verses were sung by duets of mixed voices, and attre each verse the choir joined in the chorus. After the last verse the band joined with the chori in the chorus, and then repeated the chorus by itself. Then choir, band and congregation, including the Mexi-cans, joined together and repeated the chorus with grand effect. While the great hymn was being sung all rose to their feet as is the custom with the Mexicans. A banquet at the conclusion of the pro-gram was tendered the visiting officials, the board of education and the academy inculty.
