## TAKE U.S. TROOPS OUT OF CHINA.

Gen Chaffee Advises it, and President Wants to Do It,

MUST MOVE WITH CARE

other Powers May Make War-San Francisco as a German Base-German-British Negotiations.

New York, Aug. 25 .- A special to the Herald from Washington says;

Major General Chaffee has recommended that the United States troops now in China be withdrawn so soon as all the Americans in Pekin have reached places of sufety.

His cable dispatch advising this, and secunulating evidences of the best harmony among the powers, were the main subjects of discussion at Friday's cabinst meeting. The President and all the members of the administration are anxious to get the troops out of China. at the earliest possible date, but it can be said on authority that there will be so immediate withdrawal of American forces unless there is an immediate change in conditions.

HOW IT IS VIEWED.

There is a disposition in administratisp circles to believe that General chaffee's recommendation was based on military considerations alone, and that he did not take political positions into consideration, but there is reason to think that his dispatch was sent after ensultation with intnor generals.

New York, Aug. 25 .- A dispatch to the Tribune from London says:

The report telegraphed from Washington that Germany is preparing to make San Francisco a base of supplies with a view to sending a very powerful army to China has attracted considerable attention. Your correspondent has made inquiries on the subject in ship-ping circles and finds that German orrs for stores and provisions are suffi-ently extensive to lend probability to his rumor. It certainly would not sur-vise the diplomatic authorities here if he German force should eventually reach a total of 40,000 or 50,000 men.

## JOHN J. INGALLS' VIEWS ON DEATH.

Ingalls, the Agnostic. Jan. 25, 1883.

Ben Hill has gone to the undiscovered country. Whether his journey thither was but one step across an imperceptible frontier, or whether an interminable ocean, black, unfluctuating, and voiceless, stretching between these earthly coasts and those invisible shores, we do not know.

Whether on that August morning after death he saw a more giorious sun rise with unimaginable splender above a celestial horizon, or whether his apathetic and unconscious ashes still sleep in cold obstruction and insensible ablivion, we do not know.

Whether his strong and subtle energies found instant exercise in another forum, whether his dexterous and disclplined faculties are now contending in a higher senate than ours for supremacy, or whether his powers were dissipated and dispersed with his parting breath, we do not know. Whether his passions, ambitions, and affections still sway, attract, and impel, whether he yet remembers us as we remember him, we do not know,

These are the unsolved, the unsoluble problems of mortal life and human desting which prompted the troubled patriarch to ask that momentous question for which the centuries have given no answer: "If a man die, shall be live again?"

Every man is the center of a circle whose fatal circumference he cannot

Within its narrow confines he is potential, beyond it he perishes; and if immortality is a splendid but delusive dream, if the incompleteness of every career, even the longest and most fortunate, be not supplemented and perfected after its termination here, then he who dreads to die should fear to live, for life. is a tragedy more desolate and inexplicable than death.
