Mrs. Margaret Wither, residing at 335 East First South, is reported as having diphtheria.

The Salt Lake Collegiate Institute and Westminster college have closed for Christmas two weeks' vacation.

The teachers of the Salt Lake City schools will have a special pay day on Dec. 23, so that they may have some Christmas money.

The Congregation Montefiore realizes \$1,000 by its recent ball in Christensen's hall. The money will provide the new synagogue with seats.

James Corcoran of Buffalo, N. Y., local manager of the Western Union and brother of Editor Phil Corcoran of this city, is dead.

Susanna Halford, a pioneer of '52, died at Mill Creek yesterday, aged 72. The funeral will be held from the ward meetinghouse tomorrow.

State Auditor Tingler has turned over to State Treas. Dixon a warrant for \$17,750 to pay the semi-annual interest on the state bonds which is due on Jan. 1, 1904.

The committee on admission of members to the University club will meet on the evening of the 28th inst. to act on several applications for membership in the club.

So many students in the local city institutions have been leaving for their homes within the last few days, that the railroad companies have had to put on extra cars.

No inquest is expected to be held over the remains of the Chinaman killed at Alta Saturday, and their disposition awaits the action of the Alta justice of the peace.

The Free kindergarten children had a great time Saturday, at their Christmas entertainment in the Thirteenth ward meetinghouse annex. The gifts included decorated boxes from the seventh grade of the Hamilton school, and the girls of Mrs. F. E. Davy's Sunday school class had dressed a doll for each little girl of the kindergarten.

The Democrats of this city and county have taken steps looking to a strong party organization and to this end held a meeting on Friday night, at which the matter was discussed in all its bearings. Yet no action has been taken, but it is believed that something will be done at another meeting to be held in the near future.

Judge Lewis has awarded Mrs. Rhoda Branner the custody of her 2-year-old child, Albert Jenkins, who has been withheld from her by Mrs. Coster and William Henderson, a blind man, who claims to be the father of the child. Mrs. Branner was compelled to sue for the child, as the Hendersons refused to recover possession of her child.

Salt Lake stands thirty-second in the list of cities whose bank clearings are given by Bradstreet for the week ending Thursday evening last, the figure being \$2,985,362, a decrease of 1.4 per cent from the corresponding week of last year. The heaviest falling off is at Lexington, Ky., 26.4 per cent. Generally the shrinkage is light, as Helena shows an increase of 69.3 per cent.

Suit has been filed in the district court by the Cosgriff-Cousens company against the Tropic Mercantile company to recover \$742.35 alleged to be due for merchandise sold to defendant. The same company has also filed suit against the Tropic company, J. U. Jolly, H. S. Marshall and H. A. Jolly to recover \$252.90 alleged to be due on promissory note executed by J. U. Jolly and endorsed by the other defendants.

The passenger department of the Rio Grande road published an attractively gotten up folder descriptive of the Knights Templar, triennial convalescence which is to be held in San Francisco early in September next. The interior of the folder is illustrated with half-tones of notable points of scenic interest on route, including scenes in Salt Lake City, and the covers are ornamented with Crusader designs in colors.

The Thirteenth ward schoolhouse was the scene Saturday of a merry gathering of little tots, who, accompanied by their parents and friends, had assembled for their Christmas exercises as members of the free kindergarten of this city. An excellent program of Christmas songs was rendered, while Miss Lane related a story of the birth of the Savior. Following this the tree was lighted and presents distributed to all present.

Three weeks ago a Sentinel wheel belonging to V. E. Martin was stolen from the "News" building. The matter was reported to the police but no trace of it was discovered until several days ago when Mr. Martin noticed it standing against the curb. He immediately called Officer Brown, who recovered it and took it to the hall, pending an investigation. The party having claimed he had bought it from a man now in Oregon, but as the man could not be found and the one having it made no protest, the wheel was returned to its owner. The number on the wheel had been changed, but otherwise it was quite easily identified.

Manager Campbell of the Light and Power company calls attention to the fact that no incandescent lamp ought to be used after a service of 600 hours, as by that time the carbon filament has become so attenuated that an increased power is required to furnish the light, and it is argued that the non-use of lamp used for reading, and consumers are advised to have lamps not further than four feet from where one is working. The Light and Power company will be able to avail itself of the additional 2,000 horse-power promised from the Bear River plant, and where that is to run the city railway plant, will be in position ready for service.

Contractor Campbell of the Federal building expects to stop laying stone this week on account of the weather, though he will keep the carvers and perhaps a dozen stone cutters at work all winter. There is talk in the stone cutters' union of issuing a strike against the use of all stone planers after the completion of the Federal building job; and as a result, local parties are seriously proposing to embark the manufacture of terra cotta. It is argued that the non-use of planers will make the cost of stone so great that terra cotta will be much cheaper and just as good. The use of terra cotta is introduced, cut stone takes a back seat, and many cutters are thrown out of employment thereby.

Judge Hall Finds in Favor of Ranchers in Noxious Gases Case.

Judge William C. Hall has handed down an interlocutory decree in favor of plaintiff in the injunction case of John Evans against the Highland Boy Gold Mining company et al, in which he holds that the defendant must find some means of preventing the escape of noxious gases from its smelter near Murray. The company is given until June 1, 1904, to devise such means as are necessary to prevent damage to the crops of farmers in the vicinity of the smelter, but upon its failure in that respect it will have to reimburse the farmers annually for the damage done.
