James Corcoran of Buffalo, N. Y., lo-cal manager of the Western Union and brother of Editor Phil Corcoran of this city, is dead.

Susanna Halford, a pioneer of '52, died at Mill Creek yesterday, aged 79. The funeral will be held from the ward meetinghouse tomorrow.

State Auditor Tingey has turned over to State Treas. Dixon a warrant for \$17,750 to pay the semi-annual interest on the state bonds which is due on Jan. 1, 1904.

The committee on admission of members to the University club will meet on the evening of the 28th inst., to act on several applications for membership in the club.

So many students in the local city institutions have been leaving for their homes within the last few days, that the railroad companies have had to put on extra cars.

No inquest is expected to be held over the remains of the Chinaman killed at Alta Saturday, and their disposition awaits the action of the Alta justice of the peace.

F. D. Stevenson is back after an ex-tended business trip along the Pacific coast. He says great preparations for the 1905 fair at Portaland have al-ready begun, and the grounds are now in most order. in good order.

Jacob Myers has leased Castilia Springs, and proposes to expend \$10,000 on improvements ere opening on De-coration day. A bottling plant to put up the local mineral waters, is to be established at the Springs.

Building operations at the Provo plant of the Telluride Power company have ceased for the winter, with nine buildings of the group completed, and the architectural superintendent, Mr. Leper, has returned to Salt Lake.

Judge Morse has sentenced J. Leo. Willis to 18 months in the state prison. Willis was convicted by a jury of re-ceiving stolen property. A motion for a new trial in his behalf was denied by the court.

The motion for a new trial in the case of the state vs James H. Clark, con-victed of grand larceny, has been de-nied by Judge Morse, and defendant has been ordered taken to the state prison to serve his term of five years.

The Utah Loan & Building associa-ion has filed suit in the district court against Emma Gallacher and David I. Gallacher, to foreclose a mortgage giv-en to secure a promissory note for \$2,000, which amount with interest is now due.

Manager Campbell of the Light and Manager Campbell of the Light and Power company calls attention to the fact that no incandescent lamp ought to be used after a service of 600 hours, as by that time the carbon filament has become so attenuated that an increased power is required to furnish less light, and it does not pay. He also advises that there should be a shade on every lamp used for reading, and consumers are advised to have lamps not further than four feet from where one is work-ing. The Light and Power company will be able to avail itself of the ad-ditional 2,000 horse-power promised will be able to avait itsel of the ad-ditional 2,000 horse-power promised from the Bear River Sugar plant, and by another week, the great generator that is to run the city railway plant, will be in position ready for service.

Contractor Campbell of the Federal building expects to stop laying stone this week on account of the weather, though he will keep the carvers and

There is talk in the stone cutters' union of issuing a ukase against the use of all stone planers after the completion of the Federal building job; and as a result, local parties are seriously proposing to em-bark in the manufacture of terra cot-ta, as it is argued that the non-use of bark in the manufacture of terra cot-ta, as it is argued that the non-use of planers will make the cost of stone so great that terra cotta will be much cheaper and just as good. The use of terra cotta in Chicago was started by strikes against the use of stone planers, and now terra cotta is "all the go there." It is claimed that where terra cotta is introduced, cut stone takes a back seat, and many cutters are thrown out of employment thereby.
