A few have the manhood to stand to their convictions, while much the larger portion, finding their statements of truth received not only with coldness, but even with suspicion which almost amounts to "Art thou also one of them?" and they quickly recede under the shell of silence or turn and swim with the tide of popular prejudice, in buffeting which with study and unflinching strikes the "Mormons" present the sublimest spectacle of human stability, in standing by conviction, of the age. Even their bitterest enemies know this and the knowledge of the fact gnaws at their vitals like an undying worm.

**Tabernacle Services.**—Yesterday afternoon the congregation was addressed by Elder O. W. Penrose. The first portion of the discourse was devoted to showing the difference between the hopes and aims of the Latter-day Saints and those entertained by all other religions of the world. The object of the latter was to become angels, while the Saints had a hope of attaining to a far greater weight of glory by being exalted in the celestial world as heirs of God and joint-heirs with Jesus Christ. The speaker defined the nature of an angel, as compared with a being who attained fully to the inheritance of eternal life, and explained the first principles of the Gospel, faith, repentance, baptism in water, by immersion, for the remission of sins, and the laying on of hands for the gift of the Holy Ghost as the initial portion of the pathway leading to celestial glory. He also touched upon the views of the Latter-day Saints regarding the eternal character of the marriage covenant under the Gospel, and its bearing upon the condition of those who accepted it, in this world to come. The speaker referred to the revelation on celestial marriage given through Joseph Smith the Seer, and defined the position of the Latter-day Saints in regard to its relation to the law of the land, showing with great clearness that the Saints were a strictly law-abiding people, and were contending for the rights and privileges guaranteed under the Constitution of the country not only for themselves, but for all people in the nation.

It appears that Mr. Lopez had let both the parties, the murderer and his victim, have cows in shares, and some person had informed Mr. Lopez that Roman Ortiz had sold one of his cows without permission, and Ortiz was told he must get the cow and bring her back to the ranch, which he did; and after doing so, he then went to Concho, procured two bottles of whiskey and returned to Mr. Lopez's ranch. On his arrival he went into the house where two Mexican ladies and his victim, Mr. Robert Ruiz, were engaged playing cards. Ortiz then said to Ruiz, 'You are the man who carried the tales to Mr. Lopez, and this story you are repeating may more stories about me,' and immediately fired five bullets into the body of Roberto Ruiz, killing him instantly. The murderer then fled toward New Mexico. Two officers are now in pursuit, and it is hoped he will be captured, and that in this case the law may be vindicated."

The sheriff of Apache County offers \$200 reward for the arrest of the murderer.
