WASHINGTON, D. C.

WASHINGTON, 17.—Investigations
into the conduct of McCarty, of the
Post office department, have
proved the fact that Olmsted, McCarty's
predecessor, had not been proceeded
against for his embezzlement, amounting
to fifty thousand; nor have his
bondsmen been required to pay the
amounts for which they are responsible.
Olmsted is not in custody, and has not

Vallandigham dead.

CINCINNATI, 17.—The Commercial
has the following account of Mr. Val-
landigham's affair: It appears that no
one was present with Mr. Vallan-
digham when the accident occurred but ex-
-Lieut. Gov. McBurney, who had been
associated with him in the defense of
McGahan. McBurney had expressed
some doubts as to the theory that Mey-
ers had shot himself, and Mr. Vallan-
digham placed up a pistol from the
table, saying he would show him in
half a second. Two pistols were on
the table, one unloaded, and he by
mistake took up the loaded one. He
put it in his pocket and then drew it,
knowing the magazine had been fired. Just
as it was leaving his pocket it was dis-
charged, the ball entering, it is said,
near the same place Meyers was shot.
He at once ejaculated "Oh, murder!"
and said he had taken the wrong
pistol.

While the examination was going
on he watched the surgeons at work
with eager eyes, and assisted them
in their search for the ball.

Vallandigham died at eighteen min-
utes before ten this morning. He went
down very rapidly after three o'clock,
having no pulse scarcely after that
hour. Dr. Dawson, of Cincinnati ar-
rived at three, but was too late to do any
good for the dying man. Judge Hay-
nes, his law-partner, from Dayton,
arrived this morning with other personal friends, and were with
him in his last hours. McGahan, in the
prosecution of whose case he had his
life, was taken from jail this morning
to the bedside, and shed tears as he be-
held the dying friend who had appeared
during the progress of the trial to
summon all his energy and legal ability
in his defense. Mr. Follett made
his speech to the State yesterday,
and was to have been followed by
Millikan, and it was expected Vallan-
digham would commence his argument
this evening or Monday morning.
Judge Pope, before whom the trial was
proceeding, adjourned his court this
morning until Monday. Mr. Vallan-
digham started for Baltimore last even-
ing, and is there by a dying brother.
Mr. Vallandigham's body will be taken
at once to Dayton, reaching there
about three o'clock.
