REMARKS.

WASHINGTON, 20.—A communication was referred which offers to sell to the State Department the historical papers of Benjamin Franklin, which that statesman left to his grandson, Wm. Temple. If the government does not accept, the documents will be offered in London for \$25,000.

McDonald's resolution for a standing committee on the rights of women, was taken up. McDonald advocated it; Conkling suggested a committee to be made special so that the beneficent movement in behalf of women's rights might result in something practical. McDonald insisted on a permanent committee as the subject lasted as long as the human family and would always demand consideration.

Days of West Virginia, moved to agree to a committee on rules. Agreed to, 53 to 20.

Kernan submitted a resolution asking the President for copies of any correspondence since 1880 with any agent of the United States in Switzerland or any other country respecting the sending to the United States of criminals, paupers or lunatics; adopted.

The private calendar occupied the morning hour.

Pendleton introduced and asked consideration for the joint resolution for the loan, by the Secretary of War and Navy, of flags and bunting in the government depots for use in decorating the City of Washington on the 4th of March.

McDonald, Hill, of Colorado, and Walker were appointed a committee of conference on the bill granting lands to Dakota, Montana, Arizona, Idaho and Nevada for university purposes.

Vest moved an amendment to the section excluding the Indian Territory from the operation of the bill, so that tribal reservations therein should be excluded. It would observe every treaty with the Indians.

Conkling's bill for the 30 Indian tribes on the plains. He referred to the memorial of the Presbyterian Church in the United States upon Indian rights and Indian lands, which was presented to the committee on Indian affairs for consideration.

The effect of giving land to Indians would absolutely be as it had been in the past to collect them, rapacity of the whites and to deprive them of a resting place on this continent.

The funding bill was received from the House and referred to the committee on finance.

A communication from the President was received transmitting a letter from the Secretary of the Interior, in relation to the recent offer of the United States to bring about peace between Chili and Bolivia; ordered printed.

A bill to provide the allotment of land in severalty to the Indians on the various reservations, and to extend protection laws of States and Territories over Indians, and for other purposes, was taken up.

Coke explained its provisions. The President, whenever in his judgment a reservation of land on which Indians are located, is needed for agricultural purposes is to have the same surveyed and allotted in severalty to the Indians.

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
