Two sets of field wireless stations have been asked for by the state from the war department, along with much other needed equipment. Upon the receipt of the wireless stations and the other signal material, the Utah signal corps will be as well equipped as any other in the west.

At Mt. Pleasant Tuesday night a regular meeting of the Grand Commercial club, where Captain Braby, commanding Co. D, addressed the citizens on the necessity of pulling together to make Co. D a success.

A similar movement to that in Mt. Pleasant was recently undertaken in Nephi, the station of Co. A with the result that many recruits have been secured for enlistment and a practical reconstruction of the company is an early prospect.

The course of instructions being pursued in the hospital corps this year includes lectures on first aid to the injured, taking in fractures, a kind and varied treatment; hemorrhages, acids, alkali and narcotic. All of these have been completed and the course includes many interesting subjects before the next is to be taken up.

Last Tuesday evening in the hospital corps an interesting and instructive demonstration was made showing what means to adopt to restore an apparently drowned person by means of the Dr. Sylvester method of artificial respiration.

The subjects to be taken up in the hospital corps include first aid treatment for epilepsy, apoplexy, concussion, burns, scalding and numerous other subjects. Major Tyndale and Captain J. O. Evans, both known as practicing physicians in this city, extend a cordial invitation to intelligent young men to attend these lectures which are held every Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock.

At Ogden Tuesday evening, Lieut. W. E. Kneass, in temporary command of the company, inspected the organization in full dress. Guard mount was held after inspection. Lieut. Lawrence being adjutant, Lieut. Snowden, officer of the guard, and Lieut. Kneass, officer of the mount, the band of 35 pieces from the state industrial school was present and played popular airs.

Company B at Ogden has been divided into sections for work on the target range, the season opening tomorrow at 8 a. m. on the Ogden rifle range. Lieut. Snowden, in charge of the first section, will take his men out at that time for this season's first work.

The examinations held for corporals in company C Wednesday night showed promisingly good results with Private Matthew Kinney first, Private Linze Meiosis second and Musician Harry Davis third. Private Kinney is a former member of the New York national guard.

Members of company C are supplementing their range work with the use of the sub-target gun machine, benefiting greatly by its use and discovering faults that would pass unnoticed on the target range.

INTERNAL COMMERCE MOVEMENTS FOR MARCH

Washington, April 30.—Internal commerce movements during March last, indicate a heavy lumber movement to consuming centers, according to reports received by the bureau of statistics.

This is believed to be due to increased building activity in the large cities. The receipts at the principal ports, coal, coke and pig iron trades for the month showed slackening tendencies.

March shipments of hard coal were unusually large in view of impending labor difficulties. Livestock receipts at several interior markets during March showed considerable increases over March of the previous year, but livestock receipts at four principal Atlantic and Gulf ports showed a heavy movement during March, 1909, than during the corresponding month last year.

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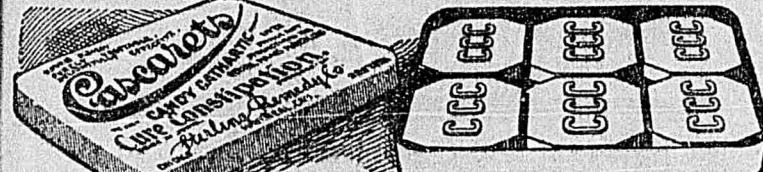
