

Prosecuting a Tailor. Sr. Louis, Aug. 31.-This afternoon nited States DistrictAttorney Bashaw filed twelve suits against Harry A. Smidt, the leading St. Louis tailor, for the sum of \$1000 each, the cause being an alleged violation of the United States law forbidding the importation of contract labor. One of the charges is that Smidt imported Peter Ledwald, who arrived in St. Louis April 21, 1886 The others are for the importation of eleven journeymen tailors, wro ar-rived here July 21, 1888. Smidt denies ie violated the law, but admits he ad vanced passage money to the men who came over, because they had no friends

TO MEET THE REQUIREMENTS OF the lately-enacted Territorial law, providing for a marriage license being issued by the Clerk of the Probate Court of the county in which the intended bride resides before a marriage can be legally performed, there has been issued from the press at this office a supply of licenses of approved form, which Probate Clerks will do well to avail themselves of. The law also requires that the person performing the ceremony return with the license, within thirty days after the marriage, a certificate over his own signaliure and countersigned by two or more witnesses present at the ceremony stating the date and place of the inarriage. These certificates, suitable for either a civil office) or an Elder of the Church to use, can be had at this office in any quantity, and Probate Clerks ought to keep some of them on

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
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
