### EASTERN.

The Wool Market.

BOSTON, 18.—The market for domestic wool is quiet and firm, with a steady demand from manufacturers, and full prices readily obtained, with more inquiry for medium fleeces, combing and daleine sections, and fine fleeces. Leasing holders are offering good prices, and are not disposed to press sales, as the demand for fine fleeces is believed to be only a question of time, as before the end of the season fine fleeces are as likely to be as short as any other kind of wool, the production of goods being reduced by manufacturers, and the result in the end being about the healthiest state of the trade. Sales of G. and Pennsylvania fleeces at \$2 1/2; for medium, and double extra \$5; for extra fine fleeces 49 1/2 52 for Wisconsin and Michigan fleeces and 57 1/2 62 for combing and daleine fleeces. Pulled wool have been arriving more freely, and prices are easing off, although desirable lots of superfine high grade in good condition, command full prices, with sales at 34 1/2 57. California fall wool is quiet, and sales can only be made at low prices, ranging from 20 1/2 26 and choice lots of spring from 39 1/2 40.

### Railway Collision.

By a collision of freight trains at Salisbury, on the eastern road, this morning, eight cars of merchandise were burned and the engine completely destroyed.

### To be Contested—Plead Guilty.

A Water Famine Threatened.

Judge Abbott intends to contest Frost's seat in the 44th Congress.

Bullard, the notorious Boylston bank robber, pled guilty to-day.

The water supply of the city has become so limited that the board has requested the co-operation of all constituents to assist in suppressing waste, and saving water.

In its use, as it is evident, unless the assumption is largely reduced, a water famine will result before spring.

### Experiments in Tea Culture.

WASHINGTON, D. C., 18.—The commissioner of agriculture says the demand for semi-tropical fruits, for experiments in the Southers, still very great, the Chinese tea plant especially, in the Chinese and many other young plants have been distributed the past year.

### The Arkansas Governorship.

The Governor, to-day, received another letter from Lieutenant Governor, Sixth of Arkansas, regarding new points contained in his recent proclamation, and asking in addition for early action on the part of the general government; the telegram was referred to the Attorney General.

### Imprisoned for Life.

In regard to the recent despatch sent by order of the President to the Governor of Texas, it is stated that without formulating or expressing an opinion as to whether or not Santanta had violated his parole, the President and Secretary Delano, fearing that he might be executed if he were to be tried, and if convicted, considered it merely just to delay his execution; to-day it was ascertained that during Gov. Davis' incumbency the sentence of Santanta was commuted from death to imprisonment for life, and under this commutation he has lately been placed in the Texas penitentiary.

### The "Empire."

NEW ORLEANS, 19.—The divers who were examining the wreck of the "Empire" this morning say that, though the vessel was not on the deck, some ten or twelve deck hands; the divers were unable to gain admission to the state rooms on account of obstructions by the freight. It is now believed that the loss of life will reach between thirty and forty.

### The Tilton-Schoeber Suit.

NEW YORK, 18.—The suit of Theodore Tilton against Henry W. Beecher has been set down for Dec. 8th.

### Soul-Saving Benevolence—P. M. General at New York.

The Methodist Episcopal Board of Missions closed its annual session, after appropriating \$82,000 for foreign missions.

Postmaster General Jewell visited the post office in this city to-day, and made a short speech to the employees.

### Forced Railway Bonds.

The Secretary of the Chicago and N. W. R. R. Co. informed the Stock Exchange to-day, of the discovery of fifteen well executed counterfeit \$1,000 bonds of that company which bear the signature of W. C. O. and came from a Philadelphia banking house where they had been received in the regular course of business.

### Father Murders his Son.

NEW YORK, 18.—Edward Griffith, of East New York, fatally shot his son George, yesterday afternoon, during a quarrel.

### Ostofellowship in Indiana.

INDIANAPOLIS, 18.—The Grand Lodge of Oddfellows of Indiana, was held here to-day, with a very interesting session. The reports of the Grand officers show an income of seventeen new lodges since the May communication, a total membership of over 24,000, and the total resources of the lodge to be over \$900,000. After a noon session, which was occupied by the re-dedication of the Grand Lodge Hall, which has been enlarged and improved, past Grand Masters, Schuyler Colfax, of Ind., and W. Ford, of Kentucky, delivered addresses.

### More of the Stolen Money Found.

CINCINNATI, 18.—The superintendent of police, and President Fargo of the American Express Co., to-day found, buried in the same place where the \$21,000 of the stolen money was found, a sum of \$16,000, having in all recovered \$37,000, leaving \$8,000 or \$9,000 yet unaccounted for. Of this amount a portion is known to have been burned by Mr. Hackney, wife of one of the prisoners arrested for the robbery. The three persons arrested implicated no others in the robbery.
