work of developing equipment with which cheaper alcohol may be put to use when it becomes available at the beginning of the coming year. An lowa manufacturing concern is experimenting with alcohol in place of gasoline for the production of gas and securing most gratifying results. A representative of the concern in Chicago yesterday declared that they have found it possible to produce 1,000 feet of illuminating gas from two and one-half to three gallons of alcohol and that a light equipped with mantle from this gas produces a 160 candle-power light as against a 47 candle-power light from the manufactured gas that is provided to consumers of gas in Chica-

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These manufacturers figure that the These manufacturers ingure that the first cost of producing gas in Chicago from materials now in use is 32 to 37 cents per thousand to produce a gas providing less than a fifty candle-power light when the mantle is used. His concern figures, therefore, that here noduced here the produced to sell at 18 to 20 cents a gallon it will immediately become a material much in favor for the manufacture of gas. C NTERPRISING concerns are al- equipped with a plant which is making ready bestirring themselves in the use of alcohol and gasoline mixed for the manufacture of gas, and results at this plant are said to be highly satis-factory. Storm Lake, lowa, is using gasoline in a plant that can be con-verted into one that can utilize alcohol as soon as the material shall become cheap enough. Machines are being operated with a two horse-power engine that will produce 12,000 cubic feet of gas an hour from alcohol or gasoline. according to the claim of the Iowa man, and machines of larger size are being produced that will provide illuminating and fuel gas for cities in size up to 8,000 inhabitants.

From the tests that have already been made there is every confidence among manufacturers that equipment will be forthcoming by which cheap alcohol may be put to use for lighting and heating as soon as the denatured pro-duct can be produced to sell down within 3 to 5 cents of the present price of

gasoline Gas from alcohol is safer for use than that manufactured from any other sub-stance known. It is declared to be nonasphyxiating and less offensive to the smell than other gas now in use, and for that reason is likely to be in high favor with consumers as soon as it be provided at reasonable cost .- Dro-
