COURT IN CHAMBERS.

Yesterday morning at the Institute, before Chief Justice Melical, Chanceller, the Emma Mine Injunction case was resumed. It will be remembered that the preliminary hearing took place yesterday week in the office of the U.S. Marshal, the defendants on that occasion filing their answer to the complaint, and obtaining a continuance for a ew days, to enable them to obtain affidavits in rebuttal, Yesterday was appointed by the court for a further hearing, the understanding being that the defendants and another 100 of fiding of should serve their affidavits on plaintiffs'

should serve their affidavits on plaintiffs' counsel as early as possible this week.

At the commencement of the proceedings yesterday morning detendants' counsel asked for a further continuance, stating that numerous counter affidavits had been prepared by the plaintiffs, some of which they had not been able to examine, and consequently they were not prepared to answer them; and the further continuance they asked for was to give them time to they asked for was to give them time to

The affidavits of the defendants, afteen in number, were read by Mr. Carter. The tweere all from practical miners who had had years of experience in different parts of the world, and who had all worked in the Emma mine. Each of these witnesses swore that no ore connection existed between the Emma mine and the property in tween the Emma mine and the property in dispute, claimed as belonging to the Illi-nois Tunnel Company, but that limestone
