Johnson, Pratt & Co.

The drug firm of Johnson, Pratt & Co. will very shortly be incorporated with a capital stock of \$100,000. Articles of association are in course of preparation. The capital stock will be divided into 100 shares of \$100 each, and the object of the corporation will be to carry on a wholesale and retail drug business, including wines, liquors, cigars, etc. The new corporation will take the stock and business of the old firm, and remove to the new Constitution Building. Further information will be given when the firm is incorporated, the firm will be known by the title of Johnson, Pratt & Co.

Police Court.

ONLY two individuals were arraigned in the police court this morning on the charge of drunkenness. The names are Frank E. Kline and Tim Kline.

Holmes pleaded guilty and was fined \$5 for his folly. In default of money, with which to liquidate his fine, he will be compelled to use a pick and shovel in the city gravel pits until the law is satisfied.

Tom King entered a plea of guilty to a similar charge, and was sentenced to ten days at hard labor.

An inmate named Ladd left \$10 to appear to answer the charge of drunkenness also. At the appointed hour the defendant was not in attendance and the amount was declared forfeited.

M. Varsi and Walter Greening are sued for \$100 damages for a car accident. The suit was filed to secure the amount.

John Angert entered a plea of guilty to the charge of trespass. Sentence was suspended.

Paul Fisher was assigned this afternoon before Judge Polk. Magistrate Kassius was present, and the name of the person of whom was mentioned.

The defendant was fined \$25 and costs of prosecution.

SUPREME COURT.

Several Decisions Given at This Morning's Session.

AN IMPORTANT OGDEN CASE.

Involving a Question of Some Interest to Dentists.

The earlier portion of this morning's sitting of the Territorial Supreme Court was occupied with the delivery of decisions in the cases given below.

In that of L. H. Meal vs. J. W. McRae, Marshal of Ogden City, Judge Canfield rendered the opinion of the court in the following terms:

The plaintiff was arrested for a violation of an alleged ordinance of Ogden City, prohibiting dentists from practicing their profession without a license or a permit of examination appointed by the City Council, and the court has discharged him after a hearing upon a writ of habeas corpus.

The plaintiff has appealed to the Supreme Court, and the defense is holding a civil suit of habeas corpus.
