Build to Garfield-L. L. Nunn filed application at the City and County building yesterday afternoon, for the extension of his West Side Rapid Transit railroad for 50 years, as he intends extending his road to Garfield a distance of 19 miles, and then to Bingham. The road will be made interurban for handling passenger and freight traffic. Heavy steel is to be used, with solid roadbed, making high speed safe, and eventually the entire line will be double tracked.

LOGAN MERCHANTS WERE IN EARNEST

Stood Ready to Cut Off All Re- Application for Writ of Prohibition lations With Salt Lake.

PAPER COMMENTS ON "NEWS"

Says The View Expressed as to Commercial Arguments Was Correct and Would Have Gone Through.

That the Deseret News was right in its statement that there was danger of Logan's "seceding" from the state, so far as any commercial alliance with Salt Lake is concerned, is the conclusion of the Logan Journal.

Dicussing a recent news item to the effect that Salt Lake merchants were worrying over their trade with Logan, the Journal declares the merchants had good reason to worry, and that had this move for an extra session gone through, the informal movement would have assumed definite and concrete form, and Salt Lake would have been decidedly put on a black list. The paper's comment which is under the heading "Will Logan Secede?" is

"Will Logan secede from the state?" or rather withdraw from Salt Lake the liberal share of patronage it has heretofore given the capital city, in the event of the success of the consolidationists—is the question row harrowing the souls of a number of Salt Lake's prominent business firms, according to the Deseret News, and making them draw long gasps and take several thinks upon a subject regarding which they might otherwise have had no dublety if they judged solely from the standpoint of persolely from the standpoint of per-sonal interest. Would they like to have the college? Of course they would! But if it is to come to them at the cost of not only Logan's, but the entire Cache valley trade, ah! that's a different proposition, and one that may well cause a reconsideration and change of front.

Nor is the alarm felt by the Salt

Lake merchants and expressed by the "News" without ground. Although the retaliatory measures feared have not yet assumed concrete form, they are likely to take that shape and be into immediate effect the moment Salt Lake, with its rapacious maw, swallows and absorbs the institution it permitted Cache valley to have be-cause at the outset the most perspicaclous Salt Lakers did not dream of the great future the school had before it, and at the moment had something they considered greater in sight. But it is the old story of covering the one ewe lamb to be added to the al-ready great flock, and, regardless of party affiliations the people of Cache valley may be relied upon to express their resentment if the robbery is consummated.

There will be no tame submission, no turning of the other cheek in this case; no humble expression of: Salt Lake hath given, Salt Lake hath taker away, blessed be the name of Salt Lake—but for all who aid, abet or the 19-year-old son of Thomas Mc-Donald, of 464 north Fifth West street, hand-writing is on the wall, and so far as Cache valley is concerned "they needn't come a hangin' round."

MORE TROUBLE FOR JUSTICE DURAND

Filed in the District Court.

CALLED AN "IGNORANT TOOL."

Man and His Mode of Procedure in Court Severely Scored-Case Dismissed-Judgment Rendered.

In an application for a writ of prohibition filed in the district court yesterday afternoon by W. F. Olsen against Justice of the Peace C. F. Durand of Murray, the Murray justice is again severely scored for his mode of procedure in transacting the business of his court and is referred to as the "ignorant tool and contemptible slave of F. G. Luke" of the Merchants' Protective association. In this instance it seems that Durand has been guilty of a decidedly unusual transaction as it is claimed that he dismissed the case against Olsen and in less than 10 days afterwards rendered judgment against Olsen in the very same case.

It is alleged that, on Jan. 25, 1996, suit was filed in Durand's court against Olsen by Albert Mayer upon an alleged promissory note. On Feb. 6 Olsen, by his attorney C. L. Olsen, moved to dismiss the complaint on the ground that the court had no jurisdic-tion as neither parties to the action were residents of Murray precinct and the pretended note was not executed or payable in Murray. It was shown that Mr. Olsen is a resident of Carbon county and not a resident of this county at all. On March 15, it is alleged notwithstanding the fact that the sult had been dismissed, Durand proceeded to render judgment against Olsen for \$138 and costs amounting to \$10,80 and has now issued an execution on the judgment. It is alleged that defendant had no notice whatever of the rendition of the judgment against him. He then appeared by counsel and moved that the illegal judgment be set aside. As to the action of the justice on that motion, the petition of Olsen has the following statement: "Said Justice Durand, still acting as the ig-norant tool and contemptible slave of F. G. Luke, has denied said motion and is proceeding to enforce said illegal judgment and execution."

The petitioner therefore asks for a

writ of prohibition to prevent Justice Durand from proceeding further in the case. Judge Morse, of the district court, issued an alternative writ of prohibition and the matter will be heard in his court in a few days.
