Manager Campbell of the Utah Light and Power company was present and made an offer to the committee to furnish all the power necessary for an electrical display if they would keep the appliances in place till a date could be arranged for the public school children to view the spectacle. 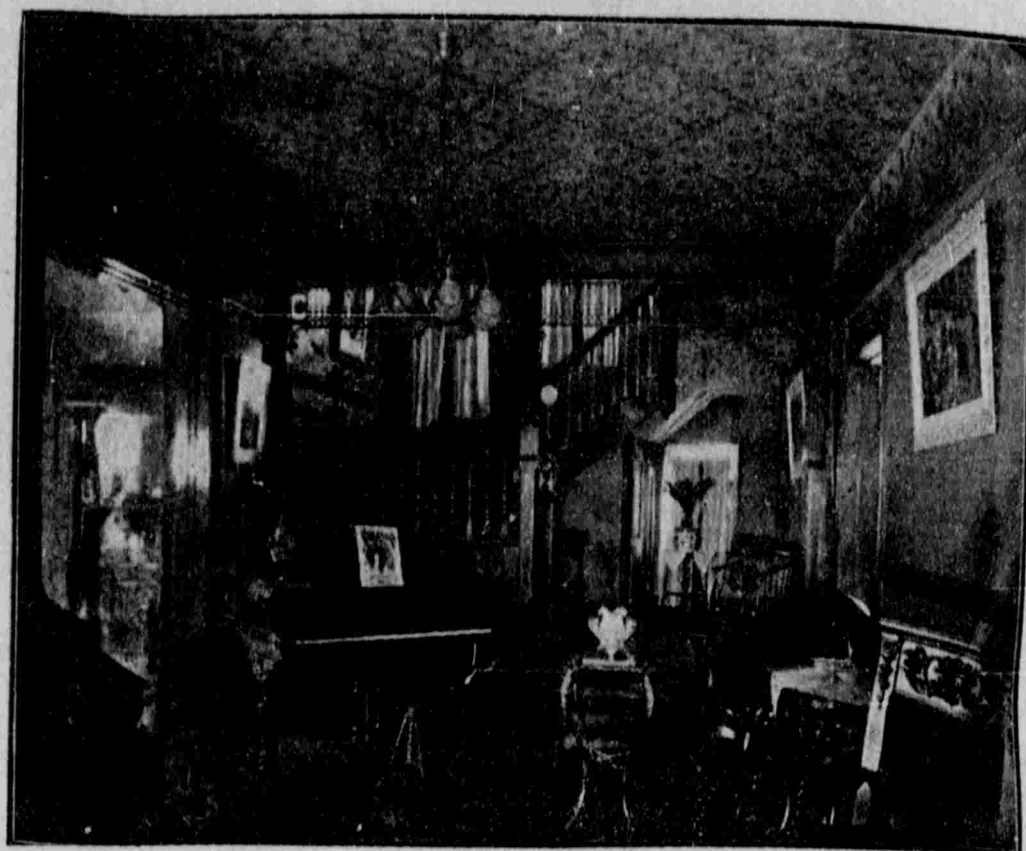

INTERIOR GLIMPSES OF SALT LAKE HOMES.



RECEPTION HALL IN PROF. DAYNES' RESIDENCE.

The above cut shows the reception hall in Prof. Daynes' residence in Sugar House ward. The hall is 37 by 15 feet in size, and its spacious dimensions make it an ideal music room, for which purpose it is also used. The stairway is at the north end, and at the south are a window and door opening on to the porch. At the southeast end of the hall is a beautifully carved oak mantel and a tiled hearth extending entirely across the hall. On the northwest, double doors lead into the parlor, and on the southwest is the library, which is circular in shape. On the right of the hall, in the southeast corner, is the dining room, and the liberal dimensions of the rooms make the distance from the extreme west corner of the parlor through the hall and to the east side of the dining room 57 feet. On the ground floor are the vestibule, parlor, library, dining room, lavatory and kitchen. On the second floor are six bed rooms, and two bath rooms, the latter having tiled floors. There are five rooms in the basement, including laundry, and the attic is 60x40 feet and 14 feet high, making an ideal dancing room. The whole interior is finished in natural woods and all the floors are polished.
