

## COME TO TERMS WITH FARMERS.

City Officials Get Important Concessions for Exchange of Waters.

### CITY COUNCIL RATIFIES ACTION.

Also Disposes of All Matters Connected With Recent Bond Issue—Other Business.

The mission of Mayor Morris, Atty. P. S. Richards and Assistant City Atty. W. H. Bramel to Big Cottonwood yesterday to consult with the owners of the waters of that stream, was very successful and resulted in the city getting two very important concessions from the farmers. First, the time in which the city may be in default for failure to furnish exchange water was extended from 12 hours to 24 hours. Second, it was agreed that measurements of the Big Cottonwood stream for the purpose of determining the basis of exchange of waters may be taken every 15 days during the irrigation season instead of every month.

The city council last evening received a communication from Mayor Morris notifying it of the concessions secured and recommending that action be taken at once to close the deals with the farmers, and also to close up all matters relative to the bond issue. The council suspended the rules as soon as the mayor's communication was read, and took up the bond ordinance and resolutions and passed them.

### BONDS AUTHORIZED.

The first matter taken up was the ordinance authorizing the issuance of \$500,000 special water bonds and \$150,000 special sewer bonds, and the sale of both issues to the Mutual Life Insurance company of New York. The ordinance was placed on its first, second and third readings and was passed by the unanimous vote of the 14 councilmen present. Councilman Hartenstein being absent.

### TRIP EAST FOR CRITCHLOW.

A resolution was then read, instructing Mayor Morris and City Recorder Critchlow to sign up \$100,000 of the water bonds and \$100,000 of the sewer bonds. It also authorized the recorder to deliver them in person to the Mutual Life Insurance company upon the payment to the city of \$500,000, being the face value of the bonds, together with \$750,000, one-half of the premium paid by the company after deducting \$100,000, one-half of the forfeit money deposited with the city as security. The resolution carried with it an appropriation of \$200 to defray the expenses of the recorder to New York. This part of the resolution was objected to by some of the councilmen, as it was stated that it would only cost \$150 to send the bonds by express. Assistant City Attorney Bramel stated that it might be necessary for the city to have a personal representative present when the bonds are delivered, so the resolution as read, including the appropriation was adopted by a vote of 11 to 1, Wood voting against it. The other \$100,000 of the bonds will be delivered in two installments, \$50,000 on Dec. 1, 1905, and \$50,000 on Dec. 1, 1906, and thus quite a saving in interest will be made.

### EXCHANGE OF WATERS.

The final matter in connection with the bond question was the resolution authorizing the mayor and city recorder to execute contracts with the Big Cottonwood Lower Canal company, the Big Ditch Irrigation company, and H. B. Ditch, William H. Park and several other owners of Big Cottonwood water for the exchange of their water for water from the city's canal. The contracts provide that the city shall pay \$5000 a year to the first named company, \$25,000 to the second company, and \$3,450 to the last named party on or before July 1, making a total of \$38,450.

### BLACK STILL OBSTINATE.

The toll was then called on the final passage of the resolution approving the contracts submitted, and it was passed by a vote of 13 to 1, Black being the only one to oppose it. He said that he still opposed the exchange because he did not think the city was getting as good a title to the water as it should have or as he had been informed it could secure. The ordinance and resolutions were submitted to the mayor at once and were signed by him. Today he signed up the first installment of the bonds and City Recorder Critchlow will leave with them for New York in the morning.

### INVITATION TO N. E. A.

A communication was received from the committee from the city schools, composed of Matheson, Thomas, Rupp, Christensen and Superintendent Ronsdale Pollock, suggesting that the city send a formal invitation to the National Educational association to hold its next session in this city. It was stated in the letter that if the board of education, city council and the business interests of the city would unite in an effort to secure the meeting of the association it would be successful. The council by a unanimous vote authorized the city recorder to extend a formal invitation to the association.

### MORE RAILROAD TRACKS.

Under a suspension of the rules the council passed ordinances granting franchises to the Oregon Short Line and the San Pedro roads to construct their tracks over certain streets in the southwestern part of the city. A franchise was also passed for the Rhod Line to construct a switch to the D. J. Sharp coal yard on Third West street. When the new tracks are completed connecting the two roads, they will give the San Pedro road an entrance

Another protest was received from the trustees of Westminster college against the opening of certain streets through the campus. ### WANTS TAX ABATED.

A petition was received from Gould B. Blakely, trustee of the estate in bankruptcy of Banker B. H. Schettler, asking that the sidewalk tax of \$122 assessed against the Schettler property on the corner of South Temple and C streets for a sidewalk on C street, be abated, for the reason that no sidewalk has been constructed and the assessment is a cloud upon the property which he wishes cleared. The committee on streets will consider the matter.

### HAS DIVINING ROD.

The petition of John Orge asking that he be employed to locate additional water supply for the city at \$2000 for each 100,000 gallons daily flow, was referred to the waterworks committee. The petitioner claims that he can locate water by the use of the divining rod and wants to demonstrate his ability to do so.

### APPROPRIATIONS MADE.

The report of the finance and library committees, recommending the appropriation of \$5,000 for furnishing the new public library, was adopted by a unanimous vote. The council adopted the report of the fire committee which recommended the appropriation of \$1,000 to the American Fire engine company for the new engine and apparatus received recently.

Love-Making Comes Near Culminating in a Tragedy.

Cornelius Smith, colored, has a most strenuous way of making love, he does it with a knife.

Last night he sought to woo Mrs. Mary Jennings, also colored, as the latter was reclining peacefully in a hammock in front of her home, 12 Franklin avenue. Mrs. Jennings did not take kindly to the fellow's attentions and plating told him so. In fact she intimated that he could please go away and let her sleep, and not come around any more.

Suddenly Smith drew a knife and plunged the blade in the woman's breast, she screamed for help. The man struck her three times more, the blade entering her back, then in the side and again in the thigh. The woman screamed repeatedly for help and neighbors rushed to her assistance. She finally fainted from loss of blood, but was revived by a physician. While the woman lay in the hospital, and while the wounds are quite serious, the physician thinks her chances for recovery are good.

After committing the murderous assault, Smith ran to his room across the street and locked himself up. Officer Tom Simpson forced the man to open the door. He was then arrested and taken to the city jail where he will be held pending arraignment on the charge of assault with intent to commit murder.

At the time Mrs. Jennings was assaulted, her husband was lying in the house sick. He heard her screams but was unable to render her any assistance.
