LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**ALMOST A FIRE.**—Between nine and ten o'clock last evening, one of the large fancy jars containing alcohol, in the window of the Co-operative Drug store, burst from some cause not known, and the alcohol, taking fire from the lamp in the window, came near causing a serious fire. Fortunately, Dr. Benedict and other attendants were at hand, who threw blankets over the flames, and succeeded in extinguishing them. The affair caused some little excitement on the street, and quite a crowd of persons assembled about the store. The damage to the window was easily remedied, there being only one of the large panes broken.

**TARGET PRACTICE.**—The second company of the third regiment, N. L., turned out yesterday for a shooting match near the Cemetery. All hands evinced an aptness and a decided improvement in shooting, which is especially creditable to the officers who have tried so hard to have their company excel in this line. The prize, one of those fine steel engravings of President Young, sold by Savage & Ottlinger, was awarded to Charles Denney for making the best shot, at a range of 225 yards. Excellent shooting was also done at a range of 600 and 700 yards. This company has always evinced an ardent interest in target practice, which others would do well to pattern after.

**FEMALE RELIEF SOCIETY.**—We have received a communication from E. M. Coombs, of Payson, giving an account of the annual meeting of the Female Relief Society of that place, and also a report of their finances. The report shows the Society at Payson as one of the most flourishing in the Territory. In Sister B. Jane Simons they have an excellent President, and the prosperity of the Society is no doubt owing in great part to her exertions. It affords us pleasure to know that the Society there, and also those in other settlements, are doing well. The Payson Society has within the past year, distributed to the needy, \$111 54, and has on hand at the present time, \$230 05, which, for a small settlement like Payson, is very good.

**FROM THE SOUTH.**—Brothers Heywood and Redd, from Harmony, called on us this morning and reported everything in a flourishing condition at that place. They have a prospect for good crops at all the settlements south of Cedar; there they met the first grasshoppers. At Parowan, Paragonah, Kanab, Meadow Creek, Fillmore and Holden, the crops are looking well and appear to be but slightly damaged by the grasshoppers. A short time since a fight occurred between the Beaver and Kadoah Indians, in which two of the Kadoah Indians were killed and one of the Beaver Indians was wounded. The citizens of Beaver stopped the fight by disarming the Indians. It resulted from a dispute arising from their gambling. The Beaver Indians appear incensed at being interfered with in their fight, and the Kadoah Indians, these brothers saw on their way up, expressed their determination to have it out in the course of five or six weeks.

**KANOSH SICK.**—We are sorry to hear that the friendly Indian, Kanosh, the Chief of the Pah-vante Indians, is sick. About three weeks ago he had the little finger of his right hand torn off by a rope on a wild horse. Not being properly cared for in time, he caught cold, which resulted in his arm swelling very considerably, all the way up to his body. He has been in a very critical condition and is not yet out of danger. Dr. North is now attending him and doing his best to save his life.

**CORN CREEK.**—We learn through a letter from Bishop Callister that the crops at Corn and Meadow Creeks never looked better. At the sink, at Chalk Creek, the crops have been destroyed by grasshoppers and much damage is being done in Round Valley. The most of the Corn Creek Indians have gone north.

**OMAHA.**—The Herald of the 31st says: "Mr. William Angel, of this city, left for Salt Lake City, yesterday. He is interested in silver mines, and intends erecting a quartz mill about sixteen miles from the City of the Saints."

The same paper says that Mr. Geo. D. Chaplin, so well known to the theatergoers of this city, would appear in the Academy of Music, Omaha, on the 1st inst., making his first appearance in English m. den.
