

## TELEGRAPHIC. A HORRIBLE HOLOCAUST.

FORTY-ONE BURSED TO DEATH AND SIXTEEN INJURED.

The Fire Is Caused by the Breaching of a Lamp During a Christmas Tree Festival.

KRAMM FALLS, Ore., Dec. 28.—There has occurred here a most horrific holocaust, occurred at Silver Lake, Lake County, Oregon, on Christmas eve, in which forty persons were burned to death and sixteen injured, five of whom will die. A large number of persons in Christmas Harbor will be buried in a common grave.

While the festivities were at their height, some was uttered on a bench, which probably escaped notice, but which was soon after heard. In an instant there was a lamp hanging from the ceiling, smothering fire, and everything in the room being dry and of an inflammable nature, the room was soon a mass of flames.

Within the hour and kept quiet, it can not yet be told.

By this time the confusion was so great that people began scrambling in a wild endeavor to reach safety. Women and children screamed under fire, and those who only knew the majority of the crowd and the uttermost panic reached screaming to the doors.

The building, a two-story frame structure, contained Christian Brothers' house on the first floor, and on the second was the hall, which was rented for gatherings of all kinds.

Silver Lake is situated in Lake County, Oregon, at about 10,000 feet above sea level, and is the nearest telegraphic office.

The news was brought here by stage from Silver Lake. Only message particulars were sent, as the little town is in a frenzy of excitement and grief.

TERRELL, Ark., Dec. 28.—A Mexican sheepherder was brought into Dallas today suffering from a gunshot wound through the thigh.

He says he was attacked by five mounted Indians while shepherding his flock near the Arkansas River. One Indian had the revolver passed from his hand, and only one of the shots taken hit him. He managed to get several rods off a mile from the scene of the shooting, when he fell to the ground, and was unable to move.

Dr. George L. Johnson, of Terrell, said the gunner was a native of Mexico, and that he had been shot in the thigh. The bullet is not a mortal.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE.

A Large Amount of Property Was Up in Smoke.

LOCHINNELL, Ky., Dec. 28.—Fire broke out between 12 and 1 o'clock this morning in the dry-goods building of Simon, Reed & Co., general merchants, located on Main, Second, State and Water. The alarm was quickly turned on, as the building is located in the business part of the city. The entire fire department was soon on the ground, but the fire spread rapidly, soon gutting the Simon, Reed & Co. building. The fire was extinguished before the rest of the fire, but the fireman's efforts were fruitless, as the building was a total loss.

OFFICES ARE BURNED.

The Conference House and the Farnsworth Building.

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 28.—The conference house of the People's party, with its offices, was destroyed by fire. The fire, started in the basement of the fire, spread rapidly, and it is probable that the conference house, Henry D. Bissell & Co., law and insurance, and Bissell & Co., millinery, burned its way through Main street. In a short time the building was consumed, and the firemen are now endeavoring to save the adjoining buildings.

The large six-story dry-goods house of Hutchinson, North & Co., opposite the Quaker building on the west side, takes the place of the conference house, and is partially occupied, and it is probable that Hutchinson Co., clothing, will be saved. The loss is estimated at \$100,000, fully insured. J. H. Quast & Co., dry-goods, secured by insurance; Hartman, Lawton & Co., furniture.

The weather is cold, and the firemen are suffering considerably from being compelled to stand in pools of water while fighting the flames.

The building of F. G. Green, dry-goods and hardware, containing Quast & Co., on the east, has been completely gutted and the building of C. M. Rice & Co., genteel furnishing goods and hardware, is now burning. From present indications have of the losses will be considerable, and the fire will probably be in the neighborhood of \$100,000.

At 8:30 a.m. The fire now seems to be under control, and will probably be confined to the Quaker building. Robinson, Norton & Co. loss about \$70,000 in dry goods that were stored in the building. Owing to the fact that the weather was very cold, the department was unable to use it.

AMERICAN SHREWD.

The Mill Burned on the Country's Tax Day.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—Mr. Von Hohenlohe, the new austrian minister, who has just arrived from Vienna, was received by a representative of the Associated Press, who informed him that Austria would follow the course of Germany, first in protesting against the American tariff, and then in retaliating against the products of this country. The minister said he had no objection to this, but the Austrian government has not up to the present time, said Mr. Von Hohenlohe, taken any steps on the American tariff. The relations with the United States have always been good, and I am confident they will remain so by a satisfactory arrangement of the sugar duty.

"The treaty between Austria and this country contains the most favored nation clause, according to which no duties shall be imposed upon any products on the products of other countries. At the time the treaty was made Austria was paying a bounty on sugar. The bounty was removed, and when the war was in its infancy, and the treaty with the United States was always in force, Austria did not know such

a thing was going on," replied Mr. Von Hohenlohe. "I am a member of the committee that made the stand and among other things said:
