LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THEATRE.—The performance last evening, like that of Saturday, was very good, each of the characters of the fine play, "Not guilty," being well sustained.

We do not wish to underrate the importance of this, but we think that people should not dress well and suitably adorn their persons, for this would be a waste.
