



Fine Prospects for Abundant Crops - Tree Planting Increasing. Special Correspondence.

Parker, Idaho, May 8 .- Since April 8th we have had delightful weather. Present prospects are favorable for an immense crop of lucern, grain and small fruits. Everything is in full month earlier than common, sub-irrigation included, which has reached us already. There are two or three cases of diph-

PERMANENT PASTURE.

Land Should be Well Prepared and Fitted Before Planting.

The following press bulletin has just been issued by Prof. Luther Foster of the Utah Experiment Station:

In seeding a piece of land for permaneut pasture, there are a number of important considerations. That piece of land which is of the least value for any production is usually selected. It is either the highest, roughest and the most sandy or gravelly soil of the low-est and wettest if there is any such

Experience has taught that lands of this character may be more profitably used for pas-ture than for any other purpose pro-vided the proper kinds of grass seed be selected and due care be given to getting the land well covered with them Sizes such pleces of land as referred
