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SESSION OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Simon Bamberger Scored for Bad Condition of Streets on His Right of Way.

AFFAIRS OF WEBER COUNTY

M. I. Musical Tonight in Weber Stake Auditorium—Marriage Permits—Police Court.

Ogden, Feb. 24.—Following a petition presented by Robert C. Carr and others protesting against the condition of Pingree, Wall and Stevens avenues said to be badly blocked with sand from excavations made by workmen, President Simon Bamberger and the Salt Lake and Ogden railway company came in for considerable criticism at last night's meeting of the city council. Upon complaint of Councilman Austin City Engineer Parker was instructed to have a survey of Healy avenue made from Lincoln to Washington to that President Bamberger could be instructed to order the city to have the necessary grading in accordance with the original agreement.

Residents of the neighborhood at Seventeenth street and Wall avenue presented a petition declaring that property was in serious danger of damage as a result of the poor condition of the Ogden river bank at that point. Proper committees were instructed to investigate and report. The street committee was empowered to have several gravel pits on Twentieth street between Madison and Monroe avenues fenced in. These gravel pits are owned by the city and Councilman Sam Thomas complained that there was a considerable amount of trespassing by the public. In preparation for contemplated improvements in the city's sewer works system a recommendation was offered by the special waterworks commission and was adopted for the purchase of three thousand feet of water mains and 12 fire hydrants of the Ludlow type.

Grant avenue residents owning property between Thirty-first and Thirty-third streets presented a petition asking that the city be instructed to have the sidewalk repaved. Their petition was referred to the sidewalk committee.

The claim of P. J. Moran, of Salt Lake, for paying and repairing Twenty-fourth street between Grant and Washington avenues amounting to \$6,925.61 was referred to the street committee and the city attorney.

Payroll amounts to \$116.50 for city employees were ordered paid.

WEBER COUNTY AFFAIRS

At a short session of the board of county commissioners held yesterday afternoon a contract was let to the Wheelwright Construction company to make two cuts in the channel of the Weber river near the Foy bridge. The contract price is \$120 and the work will begin at once. The filling in of the original channel of the river has caused it to overflow the low lands in the spring of the year. It is thought that the floods will be averted in the future by making the channel deeper.

The purpose of the projector of the club is to conduct a series of discussions on pragmatism and idealism, the nature of truth, the idealistic interpretation of reality, the relation between logical and metaphysical problems, psychological reasoning, a critical study of fundamental ethical concepts with a review of Kant's "Critique of Pure Reason," and his Prolegomena to any future metaphysics. Dr. Buxton is anxious to have papers read on the problems and methods of philosophy, as demonstrating the development of the principles that underlie all rigorous philosophical procedure, followed by consideration of some of the more fundamental issues in contemporary discussions. Platonic idealism and the philosophy of Aristotle are to be studied by the club; also the history of ethical thought, with examination of the assumptions and criteria of induction, involving suggestions regarding the teaching of logic. All important problems of epistemology will be considered. A great future is expected for this club.
