

BLOODY FEUDS OF CHINESE TONGS

Arrival of On Yicks in Salt Lake Causes Local Apprehension.

SINGS AND SUEYS INVOLVED

Wildcat Meat in Great Demand to Feed Warriors of Fighting Factions.

With the arrival of a gang of On Yick tong hightiders in Salt Lake City from San Francisco and Oakland, the entry into the bloody feud of at least two more Chinese organizations, and the inception of a determined effort on the part of Chief of Police Barlow and United States Immigration Inspector J. C. Hiss to ferret out the leaders on both sides, the tong war between the Yee family and the On Yick tong took on a decidedly serious aspect today.

As long as the fight stood only between the On Yick tong and the Yee family, the police and government authorities anticipated no difficulty in handling the war, but the feud complicated by the sudden addition of other families and tongs.

Many of those familiar with the Chinese system of reprisal for wrong done a fellow clansman are strong in the belief that the present war has advanced too far to permit of immediate amicable settlement.

OTHER TONGS INVOLVED.

Not only is the Hop Sing tong involved and preparing to enter the fight at any moment, but the Sney On tong may immediately decide to take up the fight of the Yees, both to settle an old grudge and through the pressure of circumstances. When the Yees offered rewards for the killing of On Yick ones, individual members of the Sney On tong accepted the mission. Behind this lies the old fight of the On Yicks and the Sney On several years ago. At that time the war between these tongs resulted disastrously for the Sney On, and it is said that the tong is now anxious to take up the battle with the Yees to avenge themselves on the On Yicks.

WHERE HOP SINGS GET IN.

The connection of the Hop Sings comes through an ultimatum to the Yees that if they prosecute the seven men held at San Jose, Cal., on complaint of the Yee family that they murdered Yee Hong Toy, Nov. 3, they must take the consequences, as they will join with the On Yicks and keep up the battle until not one Yee is left alive.

The Hop Sings have declared war on the Sney On because of the death of On Yung Gun, Nov. 3, in San Francisco. Though a member of both the On Yicks and the Sney On tongs, it is alleged that two Sney On men led On Yung Gun to his death on the night of Nov. 3, when these men accompanied him and offered to protect him, but led him to Jackson street and Sullivan alley, where he was shot by Yee Yin.

YEE'S ARE DISTURBERS.

The Yees, while being accredited with great wealth, have held prestige as fighters for years. During the tong wars of that period, the Yees lost many gunmen, and since then they have kept out of open fighting. It is claimed that despite this apparent withdrawal from the field of battle, the Yees have ever been reckoned as disturbers.

The abduction of Bo Due, the beautiful slave girl belonging to the On Yicks, who was stolen by a Yee man, is said to be but a minor element in the present strife. At one time the whole Yee family belonged to the Ning Ying association, one of the great Six Companies. It is claimed that the penchant of the Yees for stirring up strife brought expulsion from this society. They then joined the Yin Hoy association, another of the Six Companies. This alliance met with the same result, as the Yin Hoy association would not stand for the continual rows engendered among other members by the trouble-making Yee family. The Yees then entered the Hop Wo association and strife again broke out, resulting in half of the members of the latter company withdrawing and forming what is known now as the Sney On association. This association, together with the Yin Hoy and Hop Wo association of the Six Companies, united and formed a burial association known as the Quong Fook tong. Its aims were the disintering and transporting back to China of the bodies of its deceased members. The Yees of the Hop Wo society started another big row with the Quong Fook tong, especially against the show Hings and the Ying Hoys. It is also claimed that the object of the yees in effecting a big prize for the head of Tung King Chang, editor of the Chinese Free Press, is because of the fact that he is interpreter for the show Hings and Ying Hoys.

BIG BATTLE BREWING.

All these contingencies are cited as elements not to be overlooked in the present strife, and many Chinese as well as whites who have observed the doings of the city orientals, look for one of the bloodiest tussles in the history of Utah. Once the Hop Wo Sney On, Sney Hings, On Yicks, and other tongs become involved, the war will extend across the continent and affect every Chinese settlement in the United States.

WILDCAT MEAT IN DEMAND.

Wildcat meat is at a premium in the Chinese quarters, as a result of the strife between the Yee family and the On Yick tong. It has been brought about via mail orders in or near San Francisco since Nov. 1.

There is a superstition held among the Chinese that if their warriors are fed on the flesh of wildcats, they will acquire the tenacity of the beast, and their fighting efficiency will be increased.

much improved. The gunmen of the Yee family and the On Yick tong are ready for a big war, and the butchers of the Chinese quarters are enjoying a thriving trade in wildcat meat.

CHINATOWN SQUAD VIGILANT.

There has been no relaxation of the vigilance of the police of the Chinatown squad, and the detectives who are mingling with the Chinese every day say that killings are certain in some form before the feud dies out here. Every prominent Chinese who is remotely connected with the On Yick tong or the Yee family is surrounded by a bodyguard whenever he appears on the streets, as it is known that prices have been set on heads of many leaders of the warring factions.

GUNS OFFERED FOR SALE.

To a casual observer, the Chinese quarters look as peaceful as though a long war were a thing unknown. The inhabitants shuffle about their every day concerns without betraying any indication of nervous strain or fear on their yellow, impassive faces. The only unusual sights are the displays made by hardware dealers, who have given revolvers of all ages and makes conspicuous places in their show windows. Another startling feature that indicates the temper of the antagonists is the display of wildcats, gathered from the mountains, which are exhibited in every Chinese butcher shop.

Among the less courageous of the On Yicks and Yees there is some manifestation of fear. The police have been called upon to deal with one such case when Yee Luke, a well known Salt Lake leader of the Yee family, applied to Chief Samuel Barlow for protection.

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D. C. JACKLING PREST. OF HERALD-REPUBLICAN

The Herald-Republican Publishing company filed articles of incorporation with the secretary of state today. The concern is capitalized at \$100,000 in shares of \$10 each, with the following incorporators: Reed Shook, D. C. Jackling, C. E. Loun, Edward H. Callister, William Spry, A. L. Thomas, and Hiram E. Booth, all of whom are the holders of 10 shares each. C. E. Loun is named as trustee for 20,000 shares. The incorporation follows an agreement entered into today and the life of the corporation is stated in the articles at 100 years. The officers are: D. C. Jackling, president; William Spry, vice president; Hiram E. Booth, treasurer; and George E. Hale, secretary. The three first named with Reed Shook, E. H. Callister, A. L. Thomas and C. E. Loun form the board of directors. The officers are elected to serve one year and the first annual election will occur the first Monday in October, 1910. The property owned by the new company includes all property held by the former Inter-Mountain Republican Publishing company and the Herald Publishing company and is taken at its face value of \$400,000, including all machinery, type, paper, buildings, furniture and other property.


