Mr. Vreeland had sat for some time and heard various insinuations that the duty, which some have characterized as a "joker," was to be levied sole ly in the interest of the Standard Oil company. This he denied, and explained that his action was in response to requests from thousands of oil-producing men and in behalf of 400,000 men engaged in the same business. The debute on the off schedule called forth some bitter criticism of the Standard Oil company by Custerman of Wisconsin and others.

The Democratic arguments were for a tariff for revenue, while the Republicans attacked such schedules as those on wool, wood pulp and print paper and crude petroleum. At 6:05 p. m. the house adjourned until tomorrow, when according to general understanding, a decision will be reached to meet thereafter at 10 o'clock and remain in session until 5 p. m., when a receas will be taken until 8 p. m., the debate to continue three hours at night. CRUMPAUKER ON TARGET. During the debate today, Mr. Crum-packer (Indiana) discussed the tariff. "The object of protection," said Mr. Crumpacker, "Is to stimulate domestic industries along natural illnes, where the resources of the country are capa-ble of supplying the entire domestic demand, thereby creating home com-petition and securing to the people the comforts and necessaries of life at stable and reasonable prices.

Trusts are combinations growing out of the passion of avarice, and they are created to stifle competition and increase profits. All combinations are not trusts. Trusts exist in free trade countries as well as in countries that maintain protective tariff. Duties upon raw materials are a handicap upon the American manufacturer for the export irade. They operate to protect his competitor in the neutral markets by scribusly increasing his cost of pro-duction. There is no great producing country in the world except the United States that does not give its manu-facturers the benefit of free raw materiale,

Mr. Crumpacker made a lengthy arg-Mr. Crumpacker made a lengthy arg-ument in favor of free hides, asserting that the duty on hides has increased the cost of shoes for the wage earner, but has not created any demand for additional capital nor created employ-ment for a single additional laborer. He said the average farmer will derive more direct benefit in the decreased cost of boots, shoes, harness and other leath-er products than he now derives from the tariff on cattle hides. He proposed, as a means of expanding

He proposed, as a means of expanding trade with South America, that raw materials from that continent be admit-ted free to be made into finished prod-ucts in the United States and sold back to the South American countries. He said that the drawback provision of the Deeroe with mill used backs provision of the Payne bill will tend largely to increase export trade.

Attacking the "tariff for revenue only" pollcy of the Democratic party, Mr. Crumpacker declared that this was a sham and a fraud. He discussed the maximum and minimum provisions of the Payne bill and declared it to be a wise provision.

AGAINST OIL DUTY.

Mr. Custermann of Wisconsin oppos-ed the countervailing duty on oil, which, he argued, had enabled the Standard Oil company to sell oil in England at from 3 to 4 cents a gallou-less than in the United States.
