## THE SECOND BUILDING.

### Barratt Hall, New Latter-day Saints' College Structure, to be Erected.

The general plan for the Samuel M. Barratt memorial building for the Latter-day Saints' College, has been approved by Mrs. Barratt; and the architect, Mr. D. C. Young, is now engaged in making the plans and in drawing up the specifications. The new building will stand in the

angle, facing northwest, just south of the Business College. This building will be of the same size as the business college, but will be nearly square, and will have the gallery in the second story instead of a third floor, as in the business college.

The main floor will be used as an as-sembly and study room, and will con-tain enough book-case alcoves to hold the working library; that is, the books most frequently consulted for reference in the different departments. This room will contain a stage, and also the gallery above mentioned, and is in-tended to seat about 900 people.

The lower floor may be used as class rooms or for other purposes; but the primary object will be to make of the assembly hall proper a model auditorium, large enough for good-sized meetings and for all school gatherings. Bids will be let for the construction of this hall just as soon as the plans are far enough advanced to permit the

contractors to give in their estimates. Bishop Geo. Romney is chairman of the building committee. The present assembly hall in the business college will be converted into the banking and higher accounting department, as soon as the new hall is ready. It is thought that the new hall will be completed before the end of the sum-Important news in relation to the

Brigham Young Memorial building, which will contain other departments of the college, is expected to be available before many days.
