## WASHINGTON.

Motley defends himself—Repeal of the income tax.

WASHINGTON, 9.—The letter of Motley is dated December 7th, in which he says, after alluding to his recall: It would be impossible for any diplomat to believe himself more thoroughly possessing the confidence of the government which he had the honor to serve, than I supposed myself to enjoy at that moment. No intimation of the contemplated change had been made to me; no shadow of difference of opinion existed between the President and the government and myself, as to our relations with Great Britain, or any other power, or as to the general policy of his administration; and I was at that time very pressingly engaged in as delicate and confidential diplomatic correspondence, with your self and the British government, upon several important matters, as could well be confided by the government to its foreign agent. The report in the newspapers I dismissed, therefore, as an idle rumor, the President of the United States being incapable, as I believed, of thus dealing with a public servant whom he had himself appointed. Had a change been contemplated, I felt certain I should have been privately informed of it first, and the public afterwards. Had any charges against me, of dereliction from duty been possible, I was sure they would have been preserved to my face, so that I might have the opportunity of answering them. No man has the right to doubt that in such case, I would have at once offered my resignation.

At the end of Motley's long letter he says: I have thus recorded, in my last official act, a solemn protest against the outrage, as I believe, entirely without precedent.

The Motley correspondence is down to the 10th of December. At that date Secretary Fish addressed a letter to Moran, secretary of legation, saying Motley having closed his mission, he asks no permission but assumes as a right to place his statement on record. Questioning the taste and denying the right of this assumption, Fish, nevertheless, allows it a place in the diplomatic records of the country.

Continued efforts will be made to secure the repeal of the income tax by this Congress, but it is believed they cannot succeed.

## FOREIGN NEWS.

## GREAT BRITAIN.

Trochu issues a Proclamation—Release of Festina on their way to New York.

—Supposed dismantling of Paris Forts.

LONDON, 8.—Advices from the inside of Paris to the 3rd are received. Gen. Trochu, on the 31st December, issued a proclamation to the citizens of Paris, which says that efforts are being made to destroy the union and confidence to which Paris owes her prolonged defence. Political capital is being made of the disappointment caused by the severity of the weather. The army has, indeed, been sorely tried, and requires a brief rest, which the enemy seeks to prevent by the most violent bombardment, but that the army is preparing to act and will do its duty. There are no dissensions among the members of the government. The report of the Generals commanding the fortifications, show that slight damage has been done to the suburban villages by the bombardment; and a few men have been wounded. A council of war has approved the measures for the association of the national and mobile guards with the regular army, for the more vigorous defence of the city.

LONDON, 8.—Telegrams from Versailles to the Times to-day say the American consul has been permitted to leave Paris and has arrived here. The Prussian guns could easily shell the city. Several houses in Paris are on fire. There has apparently not been much firing to-day. The French redoubt at Notre Dame de la Mort is fire captured by the Prussians and its fire captured by the French. There are no appearances of a sortie. The Prussian losses are still insignificant.

The released Feblans, Rosa, O'Connell, McClure and Mulloy, have left for New York per the Cuba. They were taken on board under guard, who refused to allow them to communicate with anybody.

Lord Derby, in a speech at Preston, urged the government to provide the volunteers with field artillery, and divide the country into districts, each of which to furnish its quota of militia.

A correspondent at Versailles, on the 7th, telegraphs that the bombardment of the forts south of Paris steadily continues, and that the fire of the French is incessant. It is supposed that several guns in the forts are dismantled.

The weather is favorable for siege operations.

A correspondent at Margency, says the forts at Reims and Sedan have been captured by the Prussians, and that there are no more French in the forts.

LONDON, 9.—The Times' special describes the fighting along the Loire, in the forests at Vendome and Montaine, on the 8th. The French retreated westward, the Prussians following and meeting with little resistance.

The Standard intimates that if the new Alabama negotiations fail, the fact will prove due to America not to England.

## FRANCE.

Prussian Misrepresentation of the Battle of the Third Inst.

LILLE, 7.—Gen. Faidherbe, in an official communication, says he thought the Prussians would not deny the French had won a victory this time; but he finds the German bulletins, for the second time, annihilate his army. He proceeds to refute their not giving inaccuracies. He says his army did not retreat in the night after the battle of the 3rd. They remained in occupation of the villages they had conquered, and went into encampment early the following morning. Regarding the boasted pursuit, he says, the only foundation for the story is, on the morning of the 4th two squadrons charged the French rear guard. One squadron was annihilated and the other fled.
