## Secy. Wilson Believes the Stories of Damage Are Exaggerated.

New York, July 15 .- Secy. of Agriculture Wilson hopes that the corn crop of the western states has not yet been ruined by the drouth, says a Washington dispatch to the Herald. He is fisposed to believe the reports as the damage have been exaggerated. He s quoted as follows:

do not regard the corn crop as seriously damaged, notwithstanding the press reports from the western states. Ob July 1 the condition of the corn crop was more promising than on the date last year, and even if the press reports are not exaggerated, alough I am inclined to think they overstate the real conditions, there is not as yet, cause for genuine alarm. "Throughout the area of the great corn crop the drouth has not been se-vere enough to seriously damage that crop. Hot weather is not damaging to corn at this season. #### SHOOTING AT 'FRISCO.

The Third National Bund Festival **Opened** at Shell Mound Park.

San Francisco, July 14 .- Attended by

the wonted enthusiasm characterizing the assembling of German societies, the third national bund's shooting festivat of the United States of America was formerly opened at Shell Mound Park today, when President F. A. Kuhis fired three shots, "one for our adopted country, one for the old fatherland, and one

for the national shooting bund. This symbolic ceremony was preceded by a parade of all the shooting clubs and German societies through the principal streets of this city to the ferries which carried them to the park across the bay. The parade, composed of 2,000 men, under the direction of R. Wiencke, grand marshal, was divided into seven divisions, each headed by a band. The place of honor was given to the visiting societies, who marched in the following order: New York Inde-
