In stepping out of his class to battle for a title in a division one notch above for a title in a division one notch above the class he has been fighting in, Young Corbett will not necessarily be considered out of the featherweight running, as, win or lose with Britt, he will still retain the featherweight championship and will stand ready to defend it at the weight he fought Hanion. Should he win over Britt, of which he appears confident, he will be the possessor of two titles, one the featherweight, which will always be objected to by the lighter boys in that class because of his weight, and the others the lightweight, as Joe Gans, the present holder of the title, cannot battle at the required limit.
