

END OF THE WORLD.

The terrible catastrophe in Italy which caused the inhabitants of the ill-fated city of Messina to believe that the end of the world had come is only a foretaste on a small scale of what many eminent scientists believe will be the end of the world. That eternal problem of how the world will end is in the opinion of many a matter for scientific investigation, and it is curious that the majority believe that the earth will perish by fire, the place in the most gigantic earthquake ever known, an earthquake that will wipe all life from the globe before the actual destruction of the earth is complete. The late Grant Allen firmly believed

that the world would end by the crust of the earth eventually giving way beneath the colossal weight above it; and Prof. H. G. Wells, the English scientist of France, believes that damnation will begin with a war that will envelop the greatest nations in Europe, this being followed by a plague like of which has never been known, culminating with an earthquake that will practically shake the world to pieces.

H. G. Wells, whose scientific prophecies are well known, is, however, of a different opinion. The world will end, he declares, by its becoming entirely frozen over. It is a well-known fact that every year more ice accumulates around the poles; in short, many

millions of tons of ice in excess of that of the year previous settle about the earth's extremities each year, and in Prof. Wells' opinion this will gradually extend until the whole world is frozen over and every living thing is thus destroyed.

Several scientists are of opinion that we shall perish by fire, and this old-world or ours with us. Nikolai Tesla, the great American, is convinced that the atmosphere of the world being so fully charged with electricity, the only safe way to a magnetic explosion, by sympathetic induction, when the world will be entirely encircled with name which in the space of a few seconds will destroy all life.

Two of the world's greatest scientists now aver that the end of the world will be brought about by astronomical conditions. Take Prof. Marconi, the noted Austrian student. In his opinion the earth will fly from its orbit and

come in contact with one of the other planets that may chance to be in a direct collision between two trains, each traveling at 65 miles an hour.—Cassell's Saturday Journal.

COST OF LIVING.

Budgets of German Households.

How people of small means have to struggle for existence in modern Germany is illustrated by remarkable figures just published by the Imperial statistical office. A year ago the office caused 909 families in different parts of the empire to keep a systematic record of their income and disbursements. Every family received an account book in which it was requested to keep an itemized record of money spent on food, clothing, fuel, medical attention, presents, education, amusements, etc.

A teacher and his wife, without children, whose income was £145 contrived

to save £8. Another teacher and his wife, also childless, earned £160 and spent £171. Their deficit was caused by them spending £25 more for food and £8 more for entertainment than the other teacher.

A cabinetmaker and his wife, with one child 9 years of age, earned £98 and lived on £84. A painter's apprentice and his wife, also with a child of 9, earned £76 and spent £69.

A married policeman with two children, whose income of £210, and who spent £191, while a widow with two children aged four and five, earned £82 and ended the year with a deficit of £11 10s. A widower with two children and one seven-year-old girl earned £180 and spent £62 more than his income. This family spent over £20 on sports, amusements, and entertainment. A married couple with three children, the father being a brewery workman, earned £88 and saved £7 10s. The fam-

ily spent over £22 10s. on food. The income books sent in by the various families revealed the above results in order to accomplish the above results the most Spartan economy was required. In most cases not a single farthing was spent unnecessarily. The statistics attract especial interest in view of the new internal revenue taxes on various commodities which will shortly come into effect, making articles such as tobacco, cigars, matches, coffee, tea, sugar, matches, beer, cognac, and garnishes dearer.—London Daily Mail.
