

TAFT WILL HAVE STRENUOUS TIME

From Now on Until Election Day He Will be Kept Busy Campaigning.

HIS SPEECH AT YOUNGSTOWN

Details of Itinerary Not Complete—At Kansas City Spoke to Immense Audience on Y. M. C. A. Work.

Kansas City, Oct. 4.—It has been definitely decided that Judge Taft shall close his campaign on the night of Nov. 2 at Youngstown, Ohio. The national campaign of the party was opened at that place with Gov. Hughes as the principal speaker and it has been deemed fitting that the national candidate should make his closing address at that place.

The announcement was regarded as interesting from the indication it points to that the candidate will be occupied actively right up to the last. After the Youngstown meeting, Mr. Taft will leave at once for Cincinnati to cast his vote the following day.

A BUSY SUNDAY.

Candidate Taft had an exceedingly hard time to carry out what he desired and had planned a program of rest today. He reached the city at 7 o'clock this morning from Topeka and was met by a local welcoming committee, consisting of Senator William Warner, Representative E. C. Ellis and State Chairman W. S. Dieke. They escorted him to the Baltimore hotel, where a private breakfast party occupied an hour or more, and demands of local politicians for "just a handshake" consumed the time until the church hour.

With Mr. Ellis, the candidate attended services at the Beacon Hill Congregational church and from there lunched at the residence of Mr. Dieke. An automobile ride over the numerous boulevards of which Kansas City is proud was taken, after which the real work of the day began for the tired campaigner. Mr. Taft had some time ago consented to talk of the work of the Y. M. C. A. to an audience of men at the Independence Avenue Methodist Episcopal church. The audience completely filled the church, and the crowd outside which demanded admission was twice the number of that in the hall. When the service was over, the crowd was the largest of the kind in the city, and it was only after it had been announced that Mr. Taft would address the crowd that the inside meeting was allowed to proceed in quiet.

Mr. Taft delivered the same speech he made last Sunday at a similar audience in St. Paul. He gave his strongest endorsement to the work the association is doing, particularly in the Philippine Islands, the orient and in Panama, to say nothing of the work in this country. He recalled that he had participated in dedication ceremonies over a number of Y. M. C. A. buildings in the past few years, and had given the work all the encouragement of which he was capable. His speech was received with interest and enthusiasm. He made no reference in any manner to politics.

When the outdoor meeting had been addressed, Judge Taft was informed by a committee which had been waiting for him that a large meeting of negro men and women had assembled in the Independence Baptist church with the full expectation that he would come there and say just a word.

As Mr. Taft put it, when he stood before the negro audience: "I'm just looking in on you a moment as I go by."

DUTY OF NEGROES.

He then told his hearers that he was a friend of the race, had always been one and had strong beliefs regarding their condition and future. They faced, he said, a problem which the race itself must solve. He believed the negroes of the United States would solve the problem and solve it right.

"You must make yourselves useful members of the body politic," he said, "and to do this you must educate yourselves industrially and thoroughly. You must learn to be frugal and husband your resources. Your development along these lines has been great and there is but one prediction that can be made as to the future, and that is a bright one."

What Mr. Taft said moved the audience to great enthusiasm, and the speakers of the race who followed him made no pretense of concealing their political sentiments. The candidate was roundly cheered when he left the meeting, which continued with speeches strongly endorsing him politically.

It was dusk when the candidate found himself in his rooms at the hotel, when orders were issued to give him the utmost quiet possible. Mr. Taft admitted that he felt greatly fatigued with the work of the trip, but expressed the belief that a long night's rest would put him in trim for the work in Missouri, which is to begin early tomorrow.

An added meeting was placed on the itinerary today, to be held at Kansas City, Kan., at 8:30 in the morning. The route then lies through Leavenworth, Kan., St. Joseph, Mo.; Marysville, Chillicothe and Brookfield, with an evening meeting at Macon, Mo.

SALVATION ARMY TO FIGHT FOR FREEDOM

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 5.—Determined to carry out their avowed intention to defeat the ordinance of the city which prescribes certain districts in which open-air meetings may be held, and forbids them in all other places, all the members of the Salvation Army of this city, to the number of over 20, permitted themselves to be arrested last night and hauled to the police station in police vans, singing and praying as they were hurried down the downtown streets.

At police station \$25 was demanded in each instance as bail, and some of the members promptly deposited the sum. However, over half of the number, 12 women among them, determined to become martyrs to the cause, and spent the night in the jail.

Altogether over 50 arrests of Salvationists have been made during the past week, all of them being charged with violating the public meeting ordinance.

The ordinance was originally intended to prevent the holding of street meetings by individuals with anarchistic tendencies on the downtown streets.

HAINS CASE.

Lt. Farnsworth Denies Having Any Special Knowledge of It.

Fort Stevens, Or., Oct. 5.—Lieut. Farnsworth, mentioned in a New York dispatch as a possible witness in the trial of Capt. Peter C. Hains, for the murder of W. E. Annis, denies having any knowledge of the case that would make him competent as a witness. According to printed dispatches, Lieut. Farnsworth is one of three officers whose presence is greatly desired by the prosecution, but who have been transferred to posts outside New York and will therefore not be present today to testify before the grand jury.

Lieut. Farnsworth was ordered to Fort Stevens July 8 and arrived here about a week later, or a month before the killing of Annis.

IS DR. F. E. COOK LOST IN THE ARCTIC?

New York, Oct. 5.—Is Dr. Frederick E. Cook, the well known Brooklyn explorer and the conqueror of lofty Mount McKinley lost in the Arctic? This question is so disturbing to the friends of the venturesome Brooklyn physician in that borough that they are seeking his financial backer, John H. Bradley, to get him to fit out an expedition to search for him in the Arctic.

Dr. Cook started about a year ago on a daring attempt to reach the north pole. The last heard of him since he left the last post of ordinary communication was on May 7, when an Eskimo, who had accompanied him into the ice-bound wilds, returned to a point south with a letter from the doctor stating that he had reached Cape Hubbard, western Ellesmerland. This point is about 500 miles from the pole and at the time he was preparing to push northward. It appears from what his friends in Brooklyn have learned about the plans of Dr. Cook that he has set for himself what they view as a quite impossible task. Mr. Bradley accompanied Cook into the north on a hunt for polar bear and walrus.

Cook left Bradley at a point in western Greenland, intending to cross Smith's sound, Ellesmerland and the trackless region beyond, in an effort to reach the pole. It was his plan to return by the same route and then cross over an unexplored stretch of central Greenland and reach the Danish settlements on the coast.

Chicago German Americans Celebrate Anniversary of Foundation.

Chicago, Oct. 4.—Loyal Americanized Germans to the number of nearly 4,000 gathered at the Auditorium theater yesterday to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the founding of the first German colony in America at Germantown, Pa., in 1833.

The celebration was given by the Chicago German American Alliance, in connection with the formation of a state organization by the national association on Saturday.

The celebration was in the form of the musical festival but there were also callisthenics and speeches.

Several hundred school children in costumes representing the different sections of the "union fairland" led the audience first in singing "America" in English and then "Die Wacht Am Rhein" in German.

Joseph Keller, of Indianapolis, vice president of the national organization was orator of the day and stirred his auditors to enthusiasm by his expressions of respect for Germany and love for America.

Two thousand children, women and men took part in the musical program.

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MOTHER SEES HER BABE KILLED BY A BEAR

Tucson, Ark., Oct. 4.—A terrible tragedy was enacted at Ellysian Grove, a pleasure park near here, this afternoon, when a mother saw her baby escape from a cage and charged upon a lion or visitors. The animal, which had been raised in captivity, was seen to be in the habit of being given soda pop at the bar, and when it escaped it went there. It was then seen by the attendant, but returned, and when it was again driven away and an attempt made to drive it into its cage, it became enraged and charged the crowd. The wife of a Southern Pacific employee named Ellys Laird ran with a go-cart containing a 1-year-old infant. The bear pursued and snatched the infant and crushed it to death before its mother's eyes. It was attacking the woman when shot from a policeman's revolver stopped it. The bear had been a full-grown animal and filled the brute with a fusillade of bullets. The bear had been closely confined since a week ago, when it attacked a small boy.

KENTUCKY MOB MURDERS NEGRO FAMILY

Hickman, Ky., Oct. 4.—Dave Walker, a negro, his 5-year-old daughter and his baby child, were killed outright. The mother, who was holding the baby in her arms, was fatally shot and three other children will probably die as a result of a mob's visit to the Walker home near here late last night. In addition, the oldest son is missing, and is supposed to have been burned with the negro cabin, which was fired by the mob. Walker had cursed a white woman and threatened a white man with a pistol. When the mob of about 50 men ordered him to come from his house he replied with a shot. The torch was then applied to the house, and as the occupants came out they were shot down.
